"I have gained several pounds in the past few months tramping through the woods and heavy snow when I might have been 'rathering' in a small fortune through stage and motion picture work following my victory over Berlenbach," Delaney said yesterday. "I passed up the rewards for just one purpose, to improve my self physically with the heavyweight title as my goal. A severe training I will never give over 175 pounds but that's enough."

NEW YORK, Feb. 14.—Comin' back to the ring after a long lay-off due to illness, Dave Shade, California middleweight, scored a technical knockout over Vic McLaughlin in the fifth round of a ten-round "match" last night. Shade weighed 160 1/2, McLaughlin 164.

McLaughlin is a native of Prince Edward Island, and lived in Halifax for many years. He was Mike McTigue's chief sparring partner when the Irishman made Halifax his headquarters. 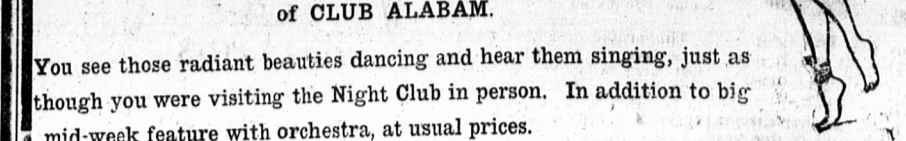

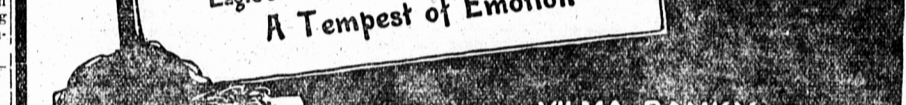

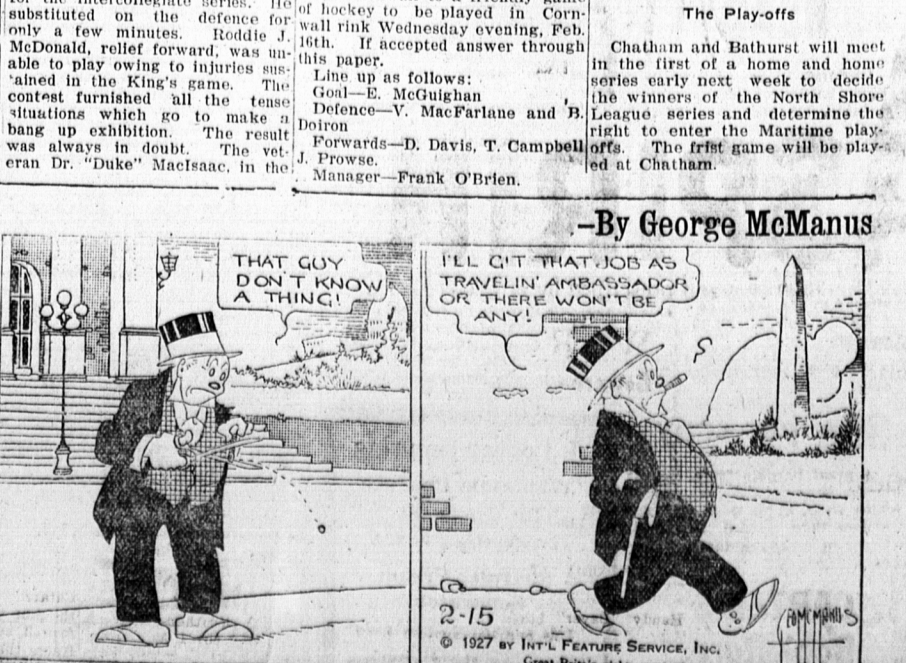
