

Baksi In 7th Round T.K.O. Over Woodcock

Becomes Candidate For June Bout With Champion Joe Louis

LONDON, April 15 (CP)—Joe Baksi tonight belted Bruce Woodcock all around Harringay Stadium to score a seventh round technical knockout and become the leading candidate to meet heavy-weight champion Joe Louis this summer.

Baksi, 25-year-old blond climber from the Pennsylvania coal mines, floored the British Empire heavy-weight champion five times in the first two rounds, won all six of the completed sessions and had Woodcock's face cut up like chopped liver when the referee mercifully halted the bout at 1:12 of the seventh round. There were no objections from the crowd of 10,700, who paid as high as \$21 (\$84) for ringside seats.

Official figures on the gate receipts were not available immediately but they were estimated at around \$50,000 (\$200,000) a British record for a fight.

Thus the former Pennsylvania beer-hall bouncer, who had to go to Britain to be taken seriously as a contender for the world title, now is close to a sure-thing to win that doubtful pleasure next time Louis defends his crown—on June 26 in New York's Yankee Stadium.

Eddie Egan, chairman of the New York State Boxing Commission, said after the fight that he favored a championship bout between Baksi and Louis.

"If contracts were put before the commission for a fight between Baksi and Louis, I am sure we should not disapprove."

Egan's comment just about sounded the knell of the world title hopes of the thin railwayman from Doncaster, Yorkshire. Last May in New York, Woodcock was knocked by Tami Maurelio, although later in the year he knocked out Gus Lesnevich in a fight on this side.

One of the ringsiders tonight was Nat Rogers, matchmaker of promoter Mike Jacobs' 20th Century Sporting Club in New York. He came with a contract calling for tonight's victor to have a mid-summer night's dream with the Bomber.

Nat inserted Baksi's name on the paper and headed for the dressing room. Baksi's manager Nate Wolfson put him off with a "we'll talk business tomorrow." But to fight writers Nat said he didn't think he or his gladiator would want the fight as early as the scheduled June 26 date.

In New York, Sol Strauss, acting director of the 20th Century Club during promoter Jacobs' illness, announced he would confer with Louis' manager, Marshall Miles, Thursday or Friday to decide the opponent.

At 213 1-2 pounds to Woodcock's 194 1-2, and sporting a 3 1-2-inch edge in reach as well as 19 pounds on the scales, Baksi won like a 1-to-10 shot, walking out from the opening bell and banging away as he made it a clean sweep of Baksi's "big boys." Last fall, he stopped the Empire light-heavyweight, in what was almost a carbon copy of tonight's tussle.

Tough Opening Day For Big Four Twirlers Of American League

(By The Canadian Press)

It was a tough day for three-quarters of the American League's Big Four twirlers yesterday as the race for the grand slam got underway in four junior circuit cities.

Hal Newhouse was the only one unscathed as he carried Detroit Tigers to a four-hit, 7-0 win over St. Louis Browns in the season opener at St. Louis.

Fireballer Bobby Feller was yanked in the eighth inning for a pinch hitter as Chicago White Sox blanked Indians 2-0 at Cleveland; Spud Chandler faded in the seventh as Phil Marchiondi pitched Philadelphia Athletics to a 6-1 win over New York Yankees in the Bronx; and Tex Hughson disappointed 30,822 Boston fans and was yanked in the eighth inning although the champion Red Sox went on to pull out a 7-6 win over Washington Senators.

The opener at Boston was almost a duplicate of last year's, when the Soxers survived Hughson's wobbly start to win 6-3 in Washington.

The 20-game right-hander got off to a fast start yesterday by setting down the first 15 batters to face him, only to lose his control in the sixth while working on a 5-0 lead.

Early Wynn went the distance for the Nats. Although Boston blasted him for three in the seventh and another in the eighth for victory.

Hughson, nicked for single runs in the sixth and seventh, blew sky high in the eighth, filling the bases on a pair of free ducks and giving way to lefty Earl Johnson when Mickey Vernon, the League's leading batter belted a double to drive in two runs.

Jet Pilot Makes Season's Start In Jamaica Handicap

NEW YORK, April 15 (AP)—Mrs. Elizabeth Graham's Jet Pilot, a 15-1 winter book shot for the Kentucky Derby, makes his first start of the season tomorrow in the six-furlong \$15,000-added Jamaica handicap, against a field that includes eight other candidates for the run for the roses.

Jet Pilot was a \$41,000 yearling who plied up winnings of \$69,890 last year, thus becoming the first over-\$40,000 buy in turf history to "win out" in his purchase price in his first season of racing. He wound up his two-year old stepping by whipping the high-powered pair of Fervent and Fruitless in the 1-1-16th-mile Pimlico futurity.

His chief opposition tomorrow figures to come from I Will, the bad-legged but rapid-running colt from the Jaelyn Stable of California radio man Jay Paley, and Sonny Whitney's Bastogne, winner of the six-furlong experimental hand-icap here last week.

Bastogne, hooked up with Khy-Bastogne as an entry in tomorrow's dash, is another 20-1 Derby chance, and may be paired with Phalanx as Whitney's one-two punch for the blue grass classic.

SYDNEY, Australia, April 14 (AP)—Dave Sands, holder of the Australian middleweight and light heavyweight boxing titles, out-thought Emory Jackson, Los Angeles negro, at Sydney Stadium tonight to avenge a previous defeat. Sands weighed 158 1-2, half a pound less than the loser.
