In the morning she was discovered to be in a pitiable condition, and was removed to the Terrace Hotel's stable where everything was done to save her life. But the dose administered had gone thoroughly through her. Mr. La Roche, who is in town, valued the mare at \$3,000.

THE Queens university journal in referring to the death of Mr. McLeod says: The news of the tragic death of Mr. McLeod by the falling of the church wall came as a great shock to his many college friends. He entered Queen's, one of a fine band of young men furnished by Prince Edward Island; in the last session held in the old Arts building, and was conspicuous amongst his class-mates for hard work, genial manner, and sterling integrity. On the occasion of a students' pow-wow, convened to discuss what the students regarded as arbitrary action on the part of the faculty in curtailing the length of the Christmas holidays, John McLeod, who had spoken almost alone, in his quiet and simple way, in favour of accepting the decision of the Senate. His normal simplicity of habits endeared him to his fellow students, who came to trust him in a singular degree, and even to love him, and afterwards no one was surprised to learn that he was an excellent minister and pastor. The portrait of him printed in the Westminster of September 29th, excellently reproduces his fine features and the open and kindly glance of eye. Our sorrow for his loss is mitigated by the fact that he died in the very act of working for the church he loved so deeply.

EXCELLENT MEETING.

(Continued from First page) School." The paper was much enjoyed by those present.

After the reading of the paper Rev. G. P. Raymond was introduced and his remarks on the organization and purposes of the S. S. Convention were very attentively listened to, and evinced the deep interest taken by him in prosecution of S. S. work and in the application of newer and better methods to such work. He showed by a map drawn for the purpose that only a portion of P. E. Island was organized into District Conventions, but he expressed the hope that the Island would ere long be completely organized.

He was followed by Mr. D. Schurman, who spoke in a very practical way on Normal Class work. He strongly urged the immediate organization of Normal Classes in the District. Considerable discussion followed and the matter of Normal Classes were laid over until the evening meeting.

EVENING SESSION.

The evening meeting was very largely attended and the best of attention prevailed throughout.

After preliminary exercises Rev. G. P. Raymond again addressed the Convention along general lines urging renewed activity in S. S. Work, strongly advocating the continuance of Sunday schools through the winter season, and considered it time to broaden out and cease moving along in the old ruts. He showed the advantage of organization and said that it tended to greater extension and wider knowledge of Bible truth. The benefits of this united S. S. Association are:—1, Organization; 2, Cooperation; 3, Education; 4, Extension; 5, Evangelization. While speaking of education he urged the organization of Normal classes in the district, interest in which was created by Mr. Schurman in the afternoon session. Two classes were then formed, one representing Kautsford and O'Leary, led by A. H. Whitman, and one representing Springfield led by Rev. A. E. Chapman. After the organization of these classes Mr. Schurman spoke on Home Department Work. The purpose of which is to extend the study of the Bible to the homes to those who either cannot or will not meet in the Sunday School. It is hoped that ere long classes for this purpose may be started.

Following this a number of questions were asked and the Field Secretary was asked to answer them which he did to the satisfaction and profit of the meeting. A statistical report was then given by Rev. Mr. Brooks, the District Secretary, which showed an increasing interest in, and extension of Sunday School work.

A hearty vote of thanks was then extended by the Convention through the President to Rev. G. P. Raymond and Mr. Schurman for their helpful services. After singing "Oh where are the Reapers" one of the best meetings ever held in the western part of P. E. Island in the interest of Sunday schools closed, to meet again in May in the Methodist Church, West Devon.

MR. Robert L. Cotton has issued a beautiful souvenir of the return home of the P. E. I. South African Contingent. It is tastefully gotten up and contains photos of both Contingents and is a timely souvenir of those we are about to honor.
