Prof. Fletcher For New Glasgow

SUCCESSFUL RECITAL IN ST. THOMAS, ONT.

The many friends and admirers of Professor W. E. Fletcher, A. R. C. M., etc. former organist and choirmaster of Trinity Church, Charlottetown and at present organist and choirmaster of Knox Presbyterian Church, St. Thomas, Ontario, will be interested to learn that he has just been appointed, out of a large number of applicants, organist and choirmaster of Trinity Church, New Glasgow, N. S. Professor Fletcher has been doing splendid work and gave excellent service in Ontario, but unfortunately the high and dry climate there does not seem to suit his health and as the opportunity presented itself of returning to the Maritimes he gladly availed himself of it. At a recital in Knox Church, held on Friday, October 17th, Professor Fletcher and his choir gave great satisfaction, the program being enthusiastically received by a large audience. The St. Thomas Times Journal in a half column critique pays the following tribute to Professor Fletcher. "It is perhaps not too much to say that Mr. Fletcher 'stole the limelight' on this occasion. His organ solos were superb. His virtuosity was wonderful and he left the audience wishing for more. He played in public for the first time his 'Requiem of the Sea' which he composed here recently, a composition reflecting the thoughts of a musician on visiting the grave of Charles Flockton, the noted Canadian actor, overlooking the sea from a cliff at Bay Fortune, Prince Edward Island. It is based on a solemn threnodic theme, the middle movement developing into a colorful representation of restless waves beating rhythmically on the shore, and ends on a note of sombre tranquility. The audience all but encored it, and indeed, Mr. Fletcher could have repeated all his numbers. It is a thousand pities that such a fine musician is not remaining in the city."
