Quebec Sensations

According to the Montreal Gazette, sensation after sensation developed at the Public Accounts Committee hearing Saturday when it continued its study into the financial affairs of the province.

To sum up, it appears that Antoine Taschereau, former Accountant of the Legislative Assembly, was probably not the only one to draw interest on Government funds deposited under the title of trust funds, and that the law was violated quite often.

Chas. Lanctot, K. C., Assistant Attorney General for many years, is to be a witness when the committee resumes work today, Wednesday.

Edgar Veziua, Provincial Auditor, testified that funds totalling about \$300,000 were deposited by Mr. Lanctot at the Caisse d'Economie, and balances were not returned to the Treasurer, as required by law, at the end of each fiscal year.

It was stated that lumber, notably shingles, had to be bought from one group of firms; that part of the profits went to the Liberal election fund; that a "trust" had been created in regard to wood materials which embraced not only Government departments, but also all those institutions which received grants from the province.

Another witness was Jimmie Valentine, former Liberal organizer in Quebec, who was quite deplorable. He clashed sharply with the Premier, who suggested to him several times that he modify his attitude, and not try to be "funny," because he might well discover that "more was known of his affairs than he suspected."

C. H. Bernatchez, new Accountant of the Legislative Assembly, appeared for a moment, and received instructions to prepare a statement showing all monies of the House which had been deposited, also to tell who the Speakers of the Assembly had been, and to inform the committee whether any one or more of the Speakers had drawn interest on Government monies and, if so, what disposal had been made of such interest money.

These were the highlights of the hour and a half proceedings.

That Body of Yours

FACIAL NEURALGIA—TRIGEMINAL NEURALGIA, TIC DOLOREUX

One of the earliest surgical operations was my privilege (or severe duty) to watch for the relief of that terrible pain in the side of the face and head called trigeminal neuralgia (tic doloreux). The pain over the whole side of the face is so terrible that at that time surgery only was the cure in the severe cases.

Dr. Joseph C. Yaskin, University of Pennsylvania, in compiling records of cases helped by other than surgical methods says, "Dr. O. Dyes, Germany, treated 20 cases of true trigeminal neuralgia with the use of the deep X-ray."

In the Journal of Medicine Dr. J. A. Caldwell reports that what is known as the Moyer or Castor Oil treatment has benefitted some cases of trigeminal neuralgia. The method is as follows: 1 or more ounces of castor oil is administered 3 times a day for several days in succession until the pain is relieved or the treatment is judged to have failed.

Dr. Caldwell states that he has had several remarkable cases where the pain stopped after this treatment. In one very severe case where all three branches of the nerve were giving pain (patient about to undergo operation) the castor oil treatment stopped the pain in 4 days and it did not return for 4 years.

"Some patients are not helped." Dr. Caldwell does not continue a trial of the castor oil treatment beyond 1 week. He reports that other cathartics do not have the same effect as the castor oil.

"I thought of the times I had frightened folks with my toy gun," confessed a youth in Los Angeles criminal court, adding: "And so, I got a real gun and did this holdup."
