Japan Increases Wheat Production

MONTREAL, Que., Dec. 20.—Japan increased her production of wheat during 1933 21.1 per cent while that of barley and rye decreased 8.7 and 18.4 per cent respectively, as compared with 1932 figures, states the Agricultural Department of the Canadian National Railways. The large increase in wheat production is due to government encouragement which was instituted last year with a subsidy of approximately 2,000,000 yen. Japan is a larger importer of wheat and the government is endeavoring to reduce the imports by encouraging domestic production.

SHIPWRECKED CREW ARRIVE IN BOSTON

Survivors of Schooner Ellen T. Marshall Criticize U. S. Consul at Yarmouth.

BOSTON, Dec. 20.—(A.P.)—Safe from the sea until they can find another vessel, 26 shipwrecked fishermen arrived in Boston today aboard the Eastern Steamship Yarmouth. They were the survivors of the Gloucester fishing schooner Ellen T. Marshall. Three of their comrades were drowned off Seal Island, N. S., after fire forced abandonment of the schooner.

The survivors, clad for the most part in ragged, clothing, rubber boots and oil-skins, were sharp in criticism of Walter H. McKinney, United States Consul at Yarmouth, N. S.

"We asked him for dry underwear," said William Beattie, Beattie was in the dory with the three who died when it was smashed to kindling on the rocks of Seal Island. He told us 'you have your oil-skins haven't you so long as your skin is covered, what do you care?'

A large delegation of relatives and friends of the fishermen were at the pier to meet them. Spokesmen said they would appeal to their Congressmen to right what they claimed was an injustice in the maritime laws. A representative of the Master Fishermen's Charitable Association also met the survivors and gave each of the penniless fishermen five dollars.

Captain Albert Hines, skipper of the Marshall, was so overcome with grief over loss of his son, Ivan 27, one of those who drowned, that he was unable to discuss the wreck.

Colours In Ice Cream

The Ontario Agricultural College found that the colour which is used to give a desirable shade to coloured ice cream may be a serious source of bacterial contamination. It is recommended that in order to prepare colours with a low bacterial count, they may be made in one of the following ways: (1) Dissolve the powder in a 45 per cent sugar solution, heat to 180 degrees F. or higher, and bottle in a sterilized container; (2) Dissolve the powder in water containing 10 per cent of alcohol, and bottle; and (3) mix the dry colour with pulverized sugar, 1 to 4, and keep in a tightly closed container. The liquid colours should be made in such quantities as can be used within a relatively short time.

Italians Using Electricity to Do Their Cooking

MONTREAL, Que., Dec. 20.—There are at present about thirty thousand electric cooking stoves in Italy and 80 per cent of this figure represents cooking plates with two or three burners, the remaining 20 per cent being made up of cooking stoves. About 80 per cent of the cooking stoves are sold in Italy through retail shops, states the Industrial Department of the Canadian National Railways. In the matter of gas cooking appliances, the plates, as in the case of electricity, predominate, accounting for approximately 80 per cent of the total.

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HEAVY SESSION IN MONTREAL EXCHANGE

MONTREAL, Dec. 20.—The general list of the Montreal Stock Exchange presented a somewhat mixed appearance at the close of today's heavy session after most of the issues had moved within a narrow range throughout the day. Broad fluctuations in liquor and a sharp advance by Dominion Bridge featured the day's trading. Volume for the day totalled more than 26,000 shares, compared with yesterday's total of about 18,000 shares.

Alcohol stocks moved over an extremely broad range. After holding at levels slightly below last night's close for the greater part of the day, the quotations took a sudden drop to register losses of more than a point, recovering shortly before the close and then turning lower once again. At the close of trading, the "A" shares of Canadian Industrial Alcohol showed a decline of a point at 19 while the "B" shares eased 1-2 per share. At the close of trading, the stock was up 2 1/2 at 28.

The remainder of the list followed the general pattern of Wall Street, where listings mullied in an uncertain manner. The majority of the price changes were of only minor proportions, but a few stocks displayed substantial gains or losses. Among the leaders, Consolidated Smelters advanced 3-4 at 127 1-2 while International Nickel eased 30 cents at 21 1/2. Canadian Bronze, making its first board top appearance in several months, showed a drop of 5 points at 15. Gurd at 7 and Canada Cement Preferred at 38 both firmied a point. Building products advanced 1 1/2 at 16 1/2 and Canadian Pacific was up 1/2 at 12 1/2. Among the laggards, Commerce eased 2 points at 130 and Montreal 3 at 167.

For instance, it was pointed out by Mr. James Tait, Chairman of the local Christmas Tree Committee, the lights are being furnished by Chappell and Co., Electric Contractors for the P. E. I. Hospital and Brown Electric Co. for the City Hospital, while the decorations themselves have been gathered by the Wolcho Club and other organizations of the city.

"The trees were installed by the local florists as a part of a national movement sponsored by the International Florists' Telegraph Delivery Association, which has members in 2200 cities of the United States and Canada.

"It is the purpose of this movement to make certain that every children's hospital ward in North America has its Christmas tree this year," explained Mr. Tait. "This is a tremendous job, but it is well worth doing, for these unfortunate youngsters have a little more pleasure as it is. We are trying to give them what every normal, healthy youngster expects at this time of the year."
