Half-Mile Coach Says Watters Can Beat Mark

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., May 19.—When Dick Floyd directs the half-milers to their marks in the I.C.A.A.A. Golden anniversary meet at the Harvard Stadium, May 29, more than a few "old-timers" will think back over the thrills that this event produced in their day.

This is the view at least of William Bingham, now athletic director at Harvard and in his athletic prime a crack half-mile runner, a rival of the famous Ted Meredith.

"Perhaps they will recall Goodwin, thrice winner in the '30s, or Holster, three times winner in the '90s, or the great John Jones or the greater Ted Meredith," said Bingham. "There will be others who will reflect what might have been had the first quarter been run a little faster or had they sprinted a little sooner. But their races have all been run and they form one of the most interesting of championship events."

"The half mile is one of eight events on the I.C.A.A.A.A. program which has been run continuously for fifty years. The slowest time was recorded in 1887 when G. M. Hammond of Princeton broke the tape in 2:20 1/2, after winning the quarter mile in fifty-four seconds. The fastest time—1:53—was run by Meredith of Pennsylvania in 1916, after winning a 47 2/5 second quarter mile.

"The first man to break two minutes in the half mile was W. C. Dohm of Princeton, who ran 1:57 1/5 in 1890. Evan Hollister of Harvard was the only man to run under 1:57 at any of the twenty-four I.A.A.A.A. meets held during the nineteenth century. Meredith has the distinction of holding the record for the longest span of years. The only man who threatened the mark was George Masters of Georgetown, whose winning time in 1925 was 1:53 5/10.

With new history to be made in the 1928 half-mile, Meredith maintains that Watters of Harvard cannot break 1:53 because he never ran a quarter-mile under fifty seconds. Two years ago Watters looked better than 1:50 to me. I still think if he can avoid pockets and run a fifty-four second first quarter, he is capable of running faster than Meredith's 1:53."

(Canadian Press.) ALBANY, N.Y., May 19.—A state wide referendum on the prohibition question is virtually assured for the fall election. "There never has been any real expression of what the people of the state think of the whole question," Governor Smith, said yesterday. "I'd like to have it settled once and for all, find out for once what they really do want. What harm will come from it?"

City League Officers Draw Constitution And By-Laws

At a meeting of the Officers of the City Baseball League held last evening the following constitution and by-laws were submitted and accepted as read:

Constitution of the Charlottetown Baseball League

Article 1 This organization shall be known as The Charlottetown Baseball League.

Objects Its objects shall be to foster and encourage Amateur Baseball in the City of Charlottetown.

Composition of League The League shall consist of three teams known as the Rovers, Anchors and Stars.

Division of Territory (a) The Rovers territory shall consist of that portion of Charlottetown and Royal North of Easton Street and Brighton Road up to and including T. Ellsworths home, St. Dunstan's University excepted.

(b) The Anchors territory shall consist of that portion of Charlottetown West of Great George St. and South of Easton Street and Brighton Road.

(c) The Stars territory shall consist of that portion of Charlottetown East of Great George Street and South of Easton Street.

Executive The Executive consisting of the President, Vice-President, Sec'y, Treasurer and an executive committee of three members shall be elected at the annual general meeting by a majority of votes of the duly accredited representatives of each section. For the purpose of this meeting each Section shall appoint two representatives who shall be empowered to vote in the name of the section appointing them.

Powers of Executive (a) The Executive shall have powers to formulate proposals, alter or amend by-laws for the government of his organization.

(b) To interpret, define and explain the provisions of this constitution and by-laws, to adjudicate all disputes arising among teams in this league.

Annual Meeting The Annual Meeting shall be held during the last week in April place and hour to be named by the President.

The Annual Meeting shall have power to alter or amend the Constitution by a majority vote of the duly accredited representatives of all sections.

BYE-LAWS

Amateur Cards Every player participating in League games must be an Amateur in good standing and must be eligible to play an affiliated club representing the City of Charlottetown.

Residence Each player participating must be a bona-fide resident of the section of which he plays at least fifteen days previous to the date set for the first league game.

Releases Any player eligible to play with a section as prescribed by by-law two who wishes to play with another section in the league may do so providing he first gets a written release signed by the secretary of the section to which he rightfully belongs and the written approval of the league executive.

Ground Rules A flag or other prominent mark shall be on the right field fence during every league game at a dis-

tance of 235 feet from the home plate. Every legally batted ball which goes over the right field fence to the left of the said mark shall entitle the base runner to a home run, every legally batted ball which goes over the right field fence to the right of said mark shall entitle the base runner to two bases only.

Reach Official American League Ball or Spaulding Official National League Ball shall be used in league games.

The first named team in the official schedule shall be considered the home team and shall keep the umpire provided with two new official baseballs and shall also be responsible for the condition of the grounds.

At every game each team participating shall provide one collector these collectors shall turn over all money collected to the league secretary for division—the division shall be as follows, forty-five percent for each team participating, ten percent to the league treasurer. The said ten percent to be used to defray any current expenses that may arise in connection with the league, the surplus if any remaining in the hands of the treasurer until the next annual meeting when it shall be disposed of as decided by the meeting.
