IN MEMORIAM

Mrs. JOHN EMMETT LARKIN

The death of Mr. John Emmett Larkin occurred at his old home at Richmond on Thursday February 15, 1934. He was the son of the late John R. Larkin and Mary McKiernan Larkin, both of whom predeceased him several years.

Following a liberal education at the public school and Prince of Wales College, he entered the wholesale and retail grocery establishment which his father at that time conducted at Sydney, C. B. In 1908 he went to Western Canada and located at Prince Rupert, B. C.

In 1915, heeding the call to arms which was then resounding throughout Canada, he enlisted in the 8th Canadian Mounted Rifles. After a short period of training, he crossed to England where he served with distinction for two years. He was invalided home in 1917 and was in Halifax at the time of the explosion which almost wrecked that city but escaped without injury.

Of his immediate family, there are left to mourn, one brother, Byron, on the old homestead, and one sister, Mary, Mrs. H. B. Gillis, of Sydney, C. B. His funeral was held on Saturday, February 10, from Immaculate Conception Church, Wellington, and was largely attended. Requiem High Mass was sung by Reverend Father Gillis, who also performed the solemn rites at the grave. The pall-bearers were: Desmond Gaudet, Rupert McDougall, Garie Pendleton, Melvin Baglole, Ray Gillis and Basil McDougall.

"REDS" CAUSE OF THREATENED PRISON RIOTS

Minister of Justice Hugh Guthrie Discusses Canadian Penitentiaries In House.

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) OTTAWA, Feb. 14.—Communist agitators were at the bottom of recent threatened revolts at Kingston Penitentiary, Minister of Justice Hugh Guthrie told the House of Commons today. It had become difficult to maintain order there because the Canadian Labor Defence League had attempted to create sympathy for the eight Toronto reds sentenced to penitentiary more than a year ago through different public channels.

"Time after time we have had threatened revolts there," said the Justice Minister, referring to the stone-walled prison on Portmouth Bay. "Every prisoner from Toronto has come there and said: 'Boys, the newspapers are for you, the churches are for you, everybody is for you. We will have another revolution and we'll all get out.' A very serious situation has resulted."

Thousands of Appeals, Thousands of appeals and demands, referring to the Toronto Communists, had been received by him in recent months, said Mr. Guthrie, most of them suggested or sponsored by the Canadian Labor Defence League and the Workers' Unity League. One propaganda agency had been distributing Christmas seals attached to express parcels in Toronto bearing the words: "Mr. Guthrie, who ordered the attempt on Tim Buck's life" (Buck was one of the Toronto Communists).

The genesis of the revolts in Kingston Penitentiary and the agitation for prison reform was in the trial of the Toronto Communists, Mr. Guthrie said. At the same time he announced a scheme of segregation would be instituted in Canadian penitentiaries based on the plan of D. M. Ormond, Superintendent of Penitentiaries, which would include a board in each prison consisting of officials and a staff psychologist to examine each man. There might be changes also in the parole system, he intimated.

Prison administration was discussed today when Miss Agnes MacPhail, the only woman in the House, proposed a parliamentary committee to inquire into prison life and the causes of crime. Debate on the motion was not concluded.

Charges that old-time barbarism was practised in Kingston Penitentiary, were levelled by Gen. A. E. Ross, Conservative member for that city. He flourished a paddle, a strap used to punish recalcitrant prisoners, before the startled members and urged that wardens be prohibited from striking. He studied with holes, he claimed the paddle would lift the hide from a man's back, "shaking the flesh like a bowl of jelly."

The Kingston member claimed his own home had been watched by men whose duty it was to report to penitentiary officials every guard who held a complaint with him. The penitentiary, said Gen. Ross, possessed a dungeon or hole, five feet underground with restricted light and ventilation only through a pipe extending to the warden's home. "That hole is there and let us remove it," he said, admitting it had needed outside influence to rid the pre-war dungeon "where men walked around on their hands and knees and clubs were needed to keep them from biting medical men on inspection."

Reforms Needed? Other reforms were needed in the penitentiary, Gen. Ross insisted. In the hospital ward prisoners continued to be held in cells which attendants were prohibited from entering, sliding medicine on saucers through the bars to the patients.

Outside influence had been needed to secure most of the penitentiary reforms in the past, said Gen. Ross and he believed this medium was needed today. The penal system of the country was wrong and should be remedied, especially as it outside influence young boys and first offenders.

Gen. Ross repeated charges he made in the House last session that certain Ontario brokers in Kingston Penitentiary. They were held at Collins Bay, a preferred class prison and their wives, when visiting them, were transported to and from the station in the warden's car.

The Minister of Justice replied with the statement that a few months after he assumed office he had dismissed Warden Jackson of Kingston to promote efficiency in the service. Recent articles carried by a Toronto newspaper, dealing with conditions in Kingston Penitentiary, were branded by Mr. Guthrie as false, exaggerated and the attempt of an ex-convict to retaliate against the system that sent him to jail.

In presenting her motion, Miss MacPhail pressed for pay for convicts. Their maintenance would be charged against them and the balance given to them and their families on discharge.

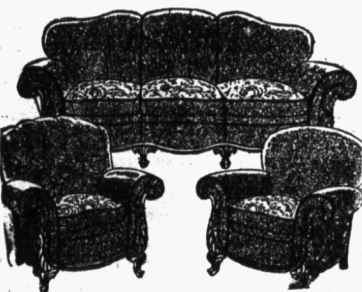
