DENTAL AUTHORITY HERE.—Dr. A. W. Price, head of the Research Institute of Dentistry, Cleveland, Ohio, and Mrs. Price, arrived in Charlottetown yesterday to spend part of his vacation here. Dr. Price delivered an excellent address before the recent Maritime Dental Convention in Halifax and with Mrs. Price he is being warmly greeted to Charlottetown by local members of the profession.

TOMORROW'S CEREMONIES.—The union service tomorrow in the First Methodist Church commemorative of Britain's entry into the war, bright, and impressive. The programme of the service is given elsewhere in this issue. There should be a large attendance. After the church service there will be a children's service in Victoria Park where also a most attractive programme will be submitted.

ISLANDER DROWNED.—Boston papers of last week record the sad death by drowning of Mr. George Dunning of Somerville, Mass., a retired chief bo'sun's mate, recalled to the service. On Monday, July 23rd, he left the water upon which he was working, crossed a coal barge which lay between him and the dock, and while trying to clamber on to the dock slipped and fell between it and the coal barge. An hour and a half later, he was found, half unconscious, clinging to the ladder. His body was jammed into the narrow space, and he had swallowed much sea water. He was taken to the Chelsea Naval Hospital, but was pronounced dead upon arrival. An inquest was held at the Charlottetown, Boston, Navy Yard, a necessary formality, when a verdict of accidental death was returned. With the above facts, was returned. The deceased was formerly a well known and highly respected resident of Summerside, as was also his widow, formerly Miss McLeod of Summerside. His baptismal name was Leonard Dunning, but some years ago he adopted the name of "George Dunning" and enlisted in the U. S. Navy, from which he retired some years ago and had been living on his pension at Somerville, Mass.
