during your fruitful term of office. "It is therefore with a profound sense of our loss that we see the day of your departure approaching. When you came to Charlottetown this church had just been blessed by Bishop O'Leary, your esteemed predecessor. The parish was in its infancy. It needed the guidance of a wise counsellor. You understood that well and from the beginning you gave your heart to the work. Your frequent visits, your wise advice, your kind words were ever an inspiration both to priests and parishioners. Your guiding hand has helped to make our parish what it is today, a successful one. We owe you a great debt of gratitude. Your Grace, and it is with genuine sorrow that we see you leaving us. We are losing a true friend and father. "But Holy Redeemer parish is only a small fraction of the field of your labors. You came for the diocese and very soon we saw how devoted you were to it. A great love for Christ and for souls filled your heart and made you keenly interested in all those entrusted to your care. Fired with the spirit of your Master, your one desire was to see His Kingdom spread among men. "You understood the meaning of His Words when Christ said to the apostles: Suffer the little children to come unto me. To accomplish this you instituted a sound and far-reaching program of Christian doctrine. By drawing up plans by advice and counsel and by many other means of encouragement you gave the diocese a working plan of catechetical instructions second to none in Canada.
