## Canadian Girl Wins Opening Events In World Skating Series

won eight of them, reducing his record to 2:07 and was regarded as one of the best pacers in Canada. In 1942 he passed into the ownership of Edna Raymond, a hotel keeper of Ottawa. His first start was at Lechute Exhibition, Quebec, in June, where he won. He followed that up by winning the Free For All at Hawker, 2:08; and the following week another one, best time 2:08. Another week later he won in 2:07. In these races he was pitted against the best free rollers in Quebec and Ontario and although occasionally dropping a heat yet emerged victor in each race. At Terrebonne, Que., he was 1:11.2 on July 28th he won the Richelieu pacing derby in Montreal, purse \$1,200, from a field of ten class pacers in 2:06.7, 2:08. Shortly after he was sold to Dr. J. MacPherson, a veterinarian and medical practitioner of Campbellton, N.B., for a sum said to be in the vicinity of \$3,000.

His next start was in the Free For All at Charlottetown, August 13th, where he met Duddy Patch 2:06.7. Victor Lee 2:07. All Great in 2:04.7. Tracy Harrow, 2:03.8. and Roney 2:05.9. He probably one of the best fields of horses that ever faced a starter in the Maritimes. Many were of the opinion that Chestnut Bars would meet his Waterloo, citing the long trip from Quebec to Charlottetown as being against him. The race turned out to be one of the best of all time in addition to being bitterly fought out it had spectacular happenings in each heat. In the third heat Chestnut Bars and Duddy Patch were practically neck and neck at the half. Friends of Duddy claimed that he had a head and shoulders to the front when they hit the wire in 1:00.9. He was beaten by Chestnut Bars by a nose. They were at the three-quarters in 1:32.4, then Duddy Patch made a break and Chestnut Bars was out in the clear, winning in 2:06.7. Had Duddy kept his feet there is a possibility that the track record would have been smashed.

Here is a report of the second heat—Duddy Patch took the lead shortly after the word and held it to the three-quarter pole. Duddy and Chestnut Bars were like a team around the upper turn and down the stretch with Victor Lee a close third, All Great fourth and Tracy Harrow fifth. Duddy and Chestnut Bars gradually forged ahead and won the heat by half a length from Duddy, with Victor Lee at Duddy's wheel and All Great in fourth. Time, 2:06.7. All Great for fourth. Time, 2:06.7. This record for Chestnut Bars, supplanting his recently acquired record in Montreal of 2:06.7. The race was drawn because of lameness this heat. The three heats in 2:07.4, 2:06.7 were the three fastest heats trotted or paced in the Maritimes that year. Chestnut Bars was splendidly driven by B. B. Foley.

On August 27th Chestnut Bars won the Free For All at St. Stephen with Duddy Patch taking the first heat in 2:09.4. The second heat was in 2:08, equalling Chestnut Bars' record in that race. His last city race of the season was a match race at Chatham with Victor Lee which he won in three straight. In 1943 he won at Chatham and Chatham by fast races at Montreal, Charlottetown and St. Stephen had their effect, even on the iron constitution of Chestnut Bars. Later he developed some form of lameness which never left him. Chestnut Bars was a beautiful chestnut with a light mane and tail and in action he was a tremble of handsomeness and a favorite with the public wherever he raced. He was really a sight as he scored for the word, tearing down the track at a two-minute shot he presented a picture not soon forgotten. Dr. MacPherson recently loved him and through the intervening years since 1943 gave him all the kindness, care and good treatment that was possible to receive. Our tribute to Chestnut Bars is that he was one of the greatest pacers that ever roared over a Canadian track and one that will not soon be forgotten in the annals of racing history.

STOCKHOLM, Feb. 14—Barbara Ann Scott—a tiny but charming skating ambassador from Canada today thrilled an expert public here with an almost perfect performance as she went into the lead in the world figure-skating championships.

At the end of the first day of the ladies' competition, judges placed the 18-year-old Ottawa girl first in all figures and agreed she was clearly superior to the other competitors. Earlier it was unofficially stated she had won all but one of the six compulsory figures. Her only close competitor was the performance of Boston, United States ice queen, Miss Scott, who won the European title two weeks ago at Davos Platz, Switzerland, scored 82.4 points in the first half of the compulsory figures to 82.2 for Miss Merrill, who had finished second behind Miss Scott at Davos Platz. Britain's Daphne Sawyer was third with 82.1 and Jeanette Altwegg, also of Britain, took fourth place with 81.6 points. Almost lost sight of in the whirl of graceful feminine forms today was the performance of Hans Gerschwiller, Swiss skater who completed his sweep of the figure-skating honors among men by winning the world championship tonight. Gerschwiller won the European title at Davos Platz.

Richard Button, 17-year-old American, was second and Arthur Hays Sulzberger, holder of the British championship, was third. But the performance of the blonde Canadian was the big event of the day. She steadily increased the lead of 10 points by which she won over Miss Merrill in the first two figures and finished with a lead of 30.8 points. After her performance she went directly to her hotel for relaxation and a rest before tomorrow's skating, she is expected to last about six hours. After the compulsory figures are completed, Miss Scott will get a chance at the phase of the competition which is most adept—the free figures. Although rated highly in the stylized compulsory figures, Barbara Ann has drawn top praise for her imagination and skill in the second event. At Davos Platz, one judge scored Miss Scott at "six" on the free figures—the equivalent of perfect.

Treen's Amherst entry 17-11.

In competition for the reserve grand championship cup, awarded by the Imperial Oil, the St. John's rink skipped by Tommy Hallett defeated the G.M. Campbell rink from Hamilton, Ont., 7-4. Throwing the last rock, with the Campbell's laying three, Hallett made a perfect draw shot. The rinks were tied 7-4 all coming home. P. T. Rudderham's Sydney, N.S. rink won the Holman Trophy, first to be decided at the bonspiel. Rudderham led his rink to a 1-6 victory over a Fredericton rink headed by J. W. Sears. The Prowse Bros. Trophy was won by a St. Stephen, N.B. rink skippered by O. W. Dunham. The St. Stephen entry won an 11-4 victory over a Moncton rink led by R. W. Lister.
