Green; Stephen Redmond, (A private in the Union army), Alonzo Perry; Maurice Thompson, (Who fought for neither the North nor South, but was a rag on every bush), Mr. J. Turner; Capt. Ward, (Private secretary to the general, and an officer in the Union army), Mr. George Pierce; Alabama Joe, (a Union spy), Arthur MacDonald; Ike Jackson, (Overseer of the Bennett Plantation), Mr. George Pierce; Mabel Parker, (a Northern girl on a visit to the South), Miss Grace Mitchell; Celia Bennett, (Southern born but a rebel at heart), Miss C. Tierney.

**ISLANDER WINS MILITARY MEDAL**

**For Conspicuous Bravery on the Field of Battle,**

The honor has this time fallen to Sergeant Charles McArthur, 5th Canadian M. R., son of Mrs. Charles McArthur, Cornwall. Sergeant McArthur has been on the firing line for upwards of two years and was only wounded slightly during that period. He left here in the old P. E. I. Light Horse overseas draft, as a private. He received his promotions on the field of battle, receiving the rank of sergeant for capturing single handed a German trench. Only last week his mother received word that he won the military medal for conspicuous bravery on the field of battle. This speaks well of the island boys. His many friends will wish him good luck for the future.

A letter from him, received by his brother Frank, is interesting:—

France, April 8th, 1917.

Dear Brother Frank—I now take the opportunity of writing you a letter which I contemplated doing for some time, but owing to circumstances I was unable to answer sooner.

I am feeling fine and enjoying life as best as circumstances permit, for as you know things might be worse. So do not worry about us. Let us be of good cheer, remembering that the misfortunes hardest to bear are those which never come."

Well, Frank, this is Easter Sunday, 3 p. m. I am writing this letter out in the sunshine, but the beauty of the sun is lost in the dim of battle, for our guns at hand are roaring incessantly and things are full of excitement.

Tell mother, that after reading her letters, I have arrived at the conclusion that she thinks we are always in dread or worried to death. Tell her that is a mistaken idea, for we are nearly always happy and contented, so do not worry about us.

Well, Frank, I have been awarded the Military Medal for good work on the "Somme." I know you will be glad to hear this. We are going into action tomorrow the 9th, and if I come through it O. K. I shall write as soon as we come out. I haven't time to write any more at present. So I shall say good-bye for the present. I remain, your loving brother,
