POSTAL EMPLOYEES HALF HOLIDAY.—As a result of a request from organized postal employees for a Saturday half-holiday all the year round or for at least a weekly half holiday it has been decided, so that as many as possible of the employees may be given a holiday, that hereafter on Saturday afternoon the Post Office will be closed at 1:00 p. m. with the exception that postage stamps will be sold at the stamp wicket as usual and general delivery and registration wickets will remain open for business. There will be no letter carrier delivery on Saturday afternoon, and the outgoing mails will be despatched on Saturday the same as usual. There will be no delivery of mail on Saturday afternoon to persons who ordinarily receive their correspondence by letter carrier. 6586-6-26M31

DOMINION DAY OBSERVANCE.—Tuesday the 1st of July being Dominion Day and a statutory holiday the Post Office will be closed, with the exception that postage stamps will be sold at the stamp wicket, and the general delivery and registration wickets will be kept open for two hours from 10 a. m. to 12 noon. There will be no delivery by Letter Carrier, and the outgoing afternoon mails will be closed at 12 o'clock for despatch. There will be no mid-day collection from the Street Letter Boxes. These changes in the manner of observing the holiday are the result of protests received from organized postal employees against distinction being made between one branch of the service and another in so far as statutory holidays are concerned. 6587-6-26M31

THE LOBSTER SEASON.—The lobster fishing season on the North Side of the island, which opened on April 25, closed on Wednesday, Fishermen from Covehead and vicinity say that owing to the prevalence of storms they did not get a month's fishing. Before they got a single haul a storm smashed all their gear. They got about two weeks' fishing after getting fixed up again, when along came another period of storm, and for eight days a boat could not leave the shore. The season ends with their gear in very bad shape, and even if they were granted an extension at the present time it would be of little good. On the South Side the season starts on August 10th and lasts to September 10th. The North Side fishermen say that if they could get an extension covering part of the time they could put it to good advantage.
