YORK AND WINSLOE CIRCUIT.—It may be explained in connection with the station sheet of the Methodist Church published in Thursday's Guardian, that the York and Winsloe circuits have been united under the superintendency of Rev. E. A. Westmoreland, residing at York, assisted by Rev. Francis Littlejohns, who will reside at Winsloe.

NOTHING DOING.—It appears, as far as The Guardian can learn, that some promotions reported in the Cus-toms Office, Charlottetown, either were not made or did not stay put. It was reported Thursday that Mr. E. DeB. Peake had been promoted to the position of Chief Clerk, since the death of Mr. White, the former incumbent. Mr. M. J. Moran has been filling the position. The head of the Department, Mr. W. B. Robertson, informed The Guardian on Thursday evening that the rumored appointment of Mr. Peake was incorrect and that no change had been made in the staff.

MR. ROBERTSON RETURNS.—Mr. Robert Robertson who is in the employ of the Provincial Department of Agriculture returned yesterday morning from the Eastern part of the Province where he was addressing meetings at St. Margarets, Rollo Bay and Red House and Kingsboro. All the meetings were well attended and much interest is being shown. Mr. Robertson reports the cattle in this part of the Province as being in rather a thin condition and not ready to do a heavy season's work profitably. There are however, a few very excellent individuals among which those owned by Rev. E. Walker of Rollo Bay are worthy of special mention. Mr. Robertson goes to the southern part of the Province next week, where he will assist in the live stock judging classes.

HOPE RIVER.—Over one hundred farmers attended the recent meeting of Hope River Institute and had the pleasure of hearing a valuable address by Prof. Ross, on "Institutes and Agriculture in general." He gave a clear explanation of the rules and regulations governing Institutes and advantages to be derived by organization, being of mutual benefit to all concerned. Proceeding he extolled the merits of the Dairy-Cow, quoting many records that have been made where good breeding, proper feeding and care is practiced, and vehemently proclaimed that the same good results can be obtained by every farmer who will use intelligence in the breeding, feeding and care of the Dairy-Cow, and by feeding all the raw material grown on the farm to dairy-cows would in a short time bring the farms up to even a higher state of production than when first broken. He referred to the egg circles being formed in the province, whereby eggs can be placed on the market in good condition, and at much better prices than at present prevailing. Many questions were asked and satisfactorily answered. Brief address were made by Messrs Arthur Simpson, W. H. Hogan, M. H. Coughlan and Rev. J. A. Gaudet, including a motion of thanks which was unanimously tendered Prof. Ross. Next meeting of the Institute will take place on Tuesday, June 24th at 8 p. m.
