A NAVAL BATTLE IN THE ADRIATIC

Austrian Cruisers Sank Fourteen Small British Drifters. Two Small British Warships Gave Chase but Retired on Approach of Austrian Battleships.

LONDON.—The British Admiralty announced fourteen drifters sunk in a raid by the Austrian light cruisers in the Adriatic Sea and that the British light cruiser Dartmouth was torpedoed in a subsequent engagement with Austrian warships.

AMERICAN RED CROSS NOW IN ENGLAND

LONDON.—Sir Alfred Keogh, Surgeon General of the British Army, announced today that the first of six fully organized and equipped hospital units which the American Red Cross is sending to France arrived in England yesterday.

BRITISH GUNS HELPING ITALIANS

LONDON.—British Heavy Artillery are co-operating with the Italian Army in the Italian offensive against the Austrians on the Julian Front.

BULGARIAN ATTACKS REPULSED

In the Eastern theatre Bulgarians attacked positions recently captured by the British, but were repulsed.

RUSSIAN GOVERNMENT REJECTS SEPARATE PEACE

Declares Its Aim to be Securing of General Peace Without Annexations or Indemnities.

(Canadian Press Despatch.) PETROGRAD.—The Provisional Government declared today it was united in the rejection of a separate peace and that it adopts as its aim—establishment of a general peace.

AUSTRIANS LOST 1,200 IN FIGHT WITH ITALIANS

(Canadian Press Despatch.) NEW YORK.—Austrian casualties in the recent Italian offensive, Tuesday are reliably stated to be 12,000.

German Catholics In Peace Movement

(Canadian Press Despatch.) AMSTERDAM.—The "Deutsche Kirchen Zeitung" states that Roman Catholic clergy of Germany have inaugurated a powerfully organized peace movement.

FRENCH CAPTURE GERMAN TRENCHES

Twelve miles west of the Sector, the French stormed the Teuton defenses near Laffaux Mill and captured some sections of trenches.

GERMAN ONSLAUGHTS REPULSED BY FRENCH

(Canadian Press Despatch.) PARIS.—The Germans once more returned to the attack on the Aisne front last night hurling troops in waves against French positions.

CONFIDENT OF FUTURE

PETROGRAD.—The formation of the Cabinet, in which six socialists are included, has been completed.

BIG SAFE ROBBERY

MONCTON.—Chief Ridout received a telephone message this morning from Chief of Police Asbel of Sussex stating that burglars has broken into the store of Jones Bros. at Apohaqui last night and blown a safe open taking one thousand dollars from the same.

BRITISH MADE SUCCESSFUL RAIDS

(Canadian Press Despatch.) LONDON.—"We made a successful raid last night near the Franco-Belgian front operations. Hostile raids were repulsed east of Loos, northeast of Arras and east of Ypres."

BERLIN REPORT

(Canadian Press Despatch.) BERLIN.—The War Office claims the capture of a French trench near Braye en Lorraine, and ten Allied planes shot down yesterday.

CONSCRIPTION MOVE HEARTILY COMMENDED

Strong Endorsation of Government's Conscription Policy Voiced in Political, Military and Educational Circles.

(Canadian Press Despatch.) TORONTO, ONT.—Satisfaction at the new conscription scheme announced by Sir Robert Borden was expressed last night by several representative men.

French Steamer Sunk 51 Persons Lost

(Canadian Press Despatch.) PARIS.—The French steamer Colbert, carrying a number of French military passengers, was torpedoed and sunk in the Mediterranean on April 30th by a German submarine.

AUSTRIANS ADMIT LOSS OF MONTKUK

(Canadian Press Despatch.) LONDON.—The loss of the Montkuk is admitted by the Austrians in an official statement issued by the Austrian War Office on Friday.

Submarine Menace Is Being Mastered

SPAIN DEMANDS SATISFACTION AND GUARANTEES
