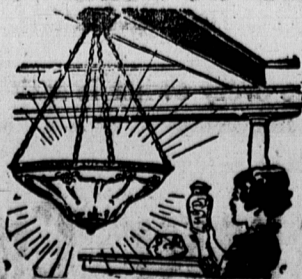

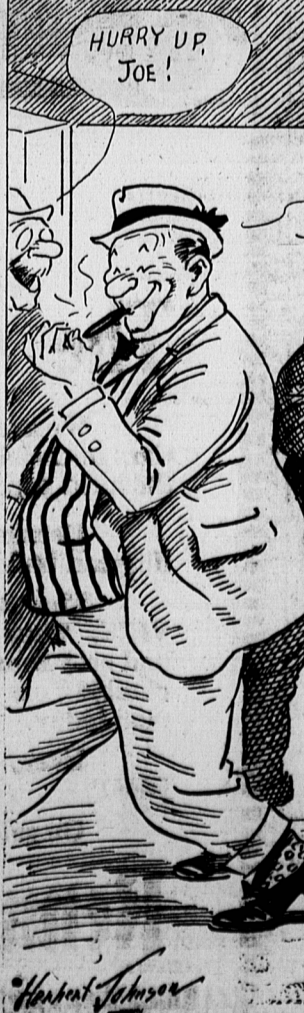
To Reinstate Men Three Days a Week

MONCTON, April 25—Dr. O. B. Price received a telegram from Ottawa Saturday to the effect that President Hanna, C.N.R., would agree to put C.N.R. men back to work on a three days a week basis. While, in Ottawa Dr. Price, together with David Cochrane, Col. Anderson and Senator McDonald, interviewed Pres. Hanna and pressed for four days a week as a basis of settlement of unemployment situation. Mr. Hanna promised to take the matter up with the C.N.R. Board of Directors on his return to Toronto and the telegram received by Mr. Price on Saturday is in answer to representations made by this delegation. The C.N.R. management agrees to put the men back to three days a week the same as has been accepted in the west and increase the hours of work as soon as possible.
