### Latest News of the City and Province.

THE Halifax Chronicle of April 2nd contains the interesting letter written by Mr. Arthur Mellish to his father, Mr. J. T. Mellish of this city. The letter appeared in the GUARDIAN shortly after it was received by Mr. Mellish.

AN exchange says:—The C. P. R. authorities are arranging a shorter train service between the Provinces of New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island, Boston and Montreal. The schedule time will be reduced two hours.

A MONTREAL despatch of a recent date says:—Sir W. C. McDonald, the millionaire tobacco manufacturer, who has already given gifts to McGill university aggregating close upon three million dollars, has just added another \$200,000 to the amount. The gift is to be used in extending the work of the mining and chemistry departments of the applied science faculty.

In referring to railroading in the Maritime provinces an exchange says:—Since the Intercolonial Railway was built this is the first winter that trains have passed through Halifax that the snow plough has not been used, and but once, only, from the Junction to Moncton, N. B., nor are they likely to be brought into requisition this winter, which will be the first time on record.

TUESDAY afternoon a young man presented a counterfeit 50 cent piece at the railway ticket office. As soon as the ticket agent received the money he detected the counterfeit and returned it with some practical advice. It is understood that quite a number of pieces of money of the same denomination are in circulation and it is difficult for the inexperienced to detect them except by the difference in weight.

A DAY or two ago two small boys managed to get a cake of ice loose in the pond, near the Gas House, and were amusing themselves by tilting it and generally ruining their clothes, when the cake was caught by the current and carried under the bridge and out into the harbor.
