MACEDONIA INVADIED BY THE BULGARIANS

The Invading Bulgarians Commanded by German Officer. Intense Indignation in Greece which May now be Forced to Take a Stand on One Side or the Other. Athens Protests to Berlin, Vienna and Sofia.

(Special to the Guardian.) SALONIKI, May 29.—Further details of the occupation of Fort Roupel by a Bulgarian force, about 1,000 strong, have been received here.

GERMAN EAST AFRICA CLEARED OF ENEMY

Brig.-Gen. Northey and Gen. Smuts Have Cleared the Country of Germans Who Retreated Everywhere.

(Special to the Guardian.) LONDON, May 29.—An official statement by the war office today on the campaign in German East Africa says, "Brigadier General Northey, commanding the British forces on the northern borders of Rhodesia and Nyassaland, reports that on Thursday he advanced twenty miles into German territory on the whole front between Lake Nyassa and Tanganyika."

German Paper Admits Truth

LONDON, May 26.—The Germans are at last admitting a shortage of food. A leading article in the Silesian Landowners' Journal says, "It is childish to continue always to hide the truth. Let us openly admit that the difficulties that have arisen, mainly in the great towns, are caused not merely by a lack of system in the distribution of the necessary articles of food, but also by the fact that the supply of such articles is inadequate."

OFFICIAL

PARIS, May 27.—(Paris Official)—"On the left bank of the river Meuse our troops yesterday evening attacked the village of Cumieres and the German position to the west. After a ferocious struggle we penetrated the eastern side of the village and occupied several of the German trenches northwest of Cumieres. Violent counter attacks by the enemy did not result in dislodging us from the occupied positions."

THE FIGHT AROUND VERDUN

(Special to the Guardian.) PARIS, May 29.—A war office communication tonight says: "On the left bank of the Meuse the enemy directed all day an intense bombardment with shells of large calibre against our first and second lines from Avocourt wood to Cumieres. About three o'clock in the afternoon the Germans violently attacked our positions on Hill 304. They were repulsed the first time with considerable losses."
