BREAKS WORLDS RECORD.

In three standing broad jumps Ray C. Ewry covered a distance of 34 feet 9 1/2 inches at the games of the Knickerbocker A. C. yesterday adding an inch and a half to the former world's record.

The jump was accomplished without apparent exertion and is all the more remarkable in the light of the scores of the second and third men, each of whom fell three feet short of the winner.

Ewry's new record is almost twice as much as could be accomplished by the ordinary individual in three standing jumps, six to seven feet being a creditable performance for each jump. The record, measured off on a city lot, is more than one-third the regulations length and almost once and a half the width.

WORLD'S TIN SUPPLY.

Up to about forty years ago Cornwall, England, supplied nearly all the tin used in the world, but now only about 7 per cent of the total supply comes from there. The Malay peninsula has taken Cornwall's place, furnishing about 60 per cent, of the world's production, and the Dutch Indies comes next, with 19 per cent.

The promoters of the company claim that \$2,600,000 has already been subscribed and they have obtained a plot of ground at Chester Pa., where it is proposed to erect the plant.

IAN McLAREN ON

REVISION OF CONFESSION.

LONDON, June 1.—Ian McLaren, the Rev. John Wilson, D. D., who last year was moderator of the English Presbyterian synod, was asked by a reporter of the Associated Press for his opinion of the American decision to revise the confession. He writes: "Many on this side of the Atlantic are glad to know that their Presbyterian brethren in the United States propose to revise the confession. It is an intellectual wonder, but would be improved by a reduction in size and an infusion of love."

BRITISH MANUFACTURERS.

LONDON, June 1.—Commenting on Lord Hamilton's letter of yesterday replying to the attack of Sir Alfred Hickman, ex-president of the British Iron Trade Association, in the House of Commons, May 23, on American locomotives and bridges, says newspapers are unsparing in their criticism of the attitude of British manufacturers towards their customers.

M. R. REID'S TERMS.

A cable from St. John's Nfld., says that Premier Bond has announced that the difficulty between R. G. Reid and the government of Newfoundland will soon be settled. It is understood that Mr. Reid has expressed his willingness to turn over the telegraph lines to the government and to give titles to some residents upon his land grants who have been termed squatters. It shall be optional for the colony to take over the railways at the end of fifty years by paying back \$1,000,000 with interest, and paying also for his concessions to the government. Mr. Reid is to receive \$300,000 to build stations on the line.
