(Special to the Guardian) LONDON, March 23.—A special detachment from Scotland Yard early today raided a shed on the London docks and confiscated 56 revolvers and 10,000 bullets, thus culminating a series of raids which had been planned to discover sources of illicit traffic in ammunition and pistols. Most of the raids have been in the suburbs.

In the meantime the three suspended students over whom the strike resulted will be reinstated on Monday, this being the date set by the Senate.

(Canadian Press) CHICAGO, March 23.—John Infoniana, 35, kneeling at his prayers was shot dead early today. Three bullets in his back. He was the second Italian to fall before assassins' bullets within thirty hours. The "Dime" as they called Diamond Joe Esposito, slumped to the sidewalk near his home Wednesday night with fifty eight shotgun slugs in his body. Whether his death and that of Infoniana were connected, police said they did not know.
