Walter and Mrs. Simpson, Bay View, were visitors to Charlottetown yesterday.

H. D. McEwen, Morell, was among the visitors to Charlottetown yesterday, returning in the afternoon.

Hon. W. S. Stewart, K. C., Charlottetown, is acting Premier in the absence of Premier Mathieson in Ottawa.

The Hazelbrook Cheese Factory has resumed operations for the season and the first work was done on Monday. Ludlow Jenkins, Mt. Albion, is in Charge.

At the police court in Charlottetown yesterday the prohibition case against George Offer was dismissed. E. Regan, charged with drunkenness, was fined five dollars or twenty days.

A. J. Houle and Mrs. Houle, Charlottetown, left yesterday morning for Montreal to attend the graduation exercises, Mr. Houle's son, Lester G., being among the successful students.

Capt. W. R. Lugar, Halifax, well known in this province, who has been investigating wrecks on the N. S. coast, including the recent stranding of the Grey, favors an ocean patrol for icebergs on ships, eyesight test and binoculars, look-outs, life-boats to cover 10 per cent, excess of passenger list, regular boat drill, double wireless staff, instruction for passengers as to life belts, in increased pay for expert seamen.

The graduation exercises took place at Falconwood Hospital, Charlottetown, on Thursday afternoon last. Addresses were given by Premier Mathieson and Dr. Conroy, who congratulated the two graduates, Miss Katherine Heath and Miss Mami McIntyre, and spoke of the excellent work being accomplished by the institution. The Premier presented the diplomas. A paper was read by Dr. Goodwill, the Superintendent, and there were also good papers read by the graduates. All the nurses were assembled in the Hall for the occasion.

The Dept. of Agriculture has made arrangements with the Live Stock Branch, Ottawa, to have a poultry man, Mr. Brown, address a series of meetings in this Province from July 8th to July 20th, inclusive. Any institutes or districts where institutes have not been established wishing to have the services of Mr. Brown should send a request to the Dept. of Agriculture as soon as possible. Mr. Brown was for a time in the employ of the Gunn Langlois Co., and is supposed to be one of the best and most experienced poultry men in Canada. It is hoped his meetings will do much to stimulate the production of egg and poultry in this Province.

Arrangements have been made by the directors of the C. S. G. Association, which is this year receiving a grant of \$50,000 for providing special prizes for exhibits taken from the prize winning fields of grain competitions which are exhibited in connection with the field crop competitions in any of the Provinces, to have the Central Canada Exhibition held this year in Ottawa, Sept. 5th to the 16th. The prize for the sheaf exhibition will be, first prize \$18, 2nd \$15, 3rd \$12, 4th \$9 5th \$6, 6th \$3. The express charges on these exhibits will be paid by directors of the exhibition. It is to be hoped that a large number of people in this Province will make entry as P. E. I. claims to be growing the best seed oats that is grown anywhere.

"I have ceased to blame the politicians," said Rev. William Lawson at the Every Day Club in St. John's, discussing the prospects for prohibition. "The Temperance Federation wants prohibition and the Moral and Social Reform Council asks for more stringent regulation. The politicians will do just what the majority of the people insist that they must do." To illustrate this statement Mr. Lawson cited the case of Prince Edward Island, where he said the leaders both of the government and the opposition, when they found that the churches and the people were united and determined, agreed to give them what they asked. Mr. Lawson likened the liquor traffic to a Goliath which challenged the home and the church, and he declared that sooner than the people dream there will arise in this province a David to destroy it as the giant of old. John was destroyed.—St. John's Ex. (Rev. Mr. Lawson, is well known in Charlottetown.)
