SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 13.—Albert Bertie, a butler here told newspapers today he had received notification that he was one of the beneficiaries of a \$35,000,000 English estate left by the late Duke of Argyll. OTTAWA, Ont., Sept. 13.—A continued firmness prevails on Canadian egg markets, further price advances were reported over the weekend. Storage stocks are moving into consumption freely in most centres. Toronto—the market is firm with receipts of fresh very light. Dealers are paying country shippers, delivered, extra 41, firsts 37, seconds 29. Prices to retailers of fresh eggs are extra 48, firsts 43, seconds 25 and 28, firsts 43, firsts 29, seconds 25. Montreal—Supplies of fresh eggs are falling off rapidly. Dealers are paying for ungraded eggs, delivered, extra 42 to 45, firsts 37 to 40, seconds 22 to 34, 1-2; extra 48 to 50, firsts 43 to 44, 1-2; extra 38 to 40, and of storage, extra 43 to 45, firsts 39 to 40, seconds 34 to 35. Winnipeg—With decreased receipts and strong demand market has made further advances. Dealers are quoting country shippers delivered, extra 36, firsts 33, seconds 25, prices to retailers are extra 40, firsts 37, seconds 30. Poultry receipts show an increase with very little price change. Saskatchewan—the market is steady with fresh receipts very light. Storage stocks are reaching retailers at extra 36 to 33, firsts 34 to 36, seconds 24. Edmonton—the market is firm, under very light receipts. Country dealers are selling ungraded eggs extra 27, firsts 25, seconds 18. Prices to retailers extra 40, firsts 36, seconds 27. Calgary—Receipts are light due partly to bad weather. Dealers are paying extra 28, firsts 26, seconds 20. Prices to retailers extra 42 per case, firsts \$10.80, second \$8.40. Vancouver—Dealers are paying for ungraded eggs delivered extra 42, firsts 39, pullet extra 35 to 36, wholesalers are quoting to retailers extra 48, firsts 45, pullets extra 40 to 41. Saint John, N. B.—Country dealers are selling extra 43, firsts 39, seconds 32. Prices to retailers extra 47, firsts 42, seconds 37. Charlottetown—Wholesalers are quoting country shippers extra 29, firsts 23, seconds 27.

He passed to the Australian treaty. He was for a treaty which would give a preference in the Canadian market to Australian dairy and fruit products, and would at the same time protect the Canadian farmer; and if he were returned to treaty, that he would never really touch the tariff at all. He had raised the sales tax on the necessities of the household to compensate for the reduction of income taxes. They had made motor cars cheaper, not by any genuine reduction of import duty, but by abolishing the luxury tax on Canadian-made cars.

The critical part of the Premier's speech was first of all concerned with the Robb budget, and secondly with the influence of group government under the auspices of the King regime. He contrasted the alternatives available to the electors of Canada at the coming election. It was either the return of the Conservatives with a definite program, or it was a continuance of group government, which he declared his unwillingness to accept. He placed at its doors responsibility for the recent impotence of Parliament.

We are conscious that this review of the Premier's speech—brief and inadequate as we have been obliged to make it—is friendly to Mr. Meighen. On the merits of his pronouncement last night, we think Mr. Meighen is entitled to a friendly word. He indulged in no platform rhetoric. He waded no flag, other of strong patriotism or of narrow partisanship. He made no promises. He offered no bribes. He said what he would do in certain important matters if he was confirmed as Premier.

If Mr. Meighen continues to say throughout Canada what he said here last night, and in the same manner, we think he will impress as he impressed the citizens of Vancouver who heard him at Hastings Park.

### Hon. H. H. Stevens Charges Sun Publishing Co. With Libel

(Canadian Press)

VANCOUVER, Sept. 13.—Hon. H. H. Stevens, federal Minister of Customs and Conservative candidate in Vancouver Centre, caused a writ to be issued in the supreme court this morning against the Sun Publishing Company and Robert J. Cromie, claiming \$100,000 damages for alleged libel because of the publication in the Vancouver Sun on September 7th last of an alleged facsimile of a letter dated November 4th, 1922, purporting to have been written by the plaintiff to the Canadian United States Oil and Refining Company.

Libel is also alleged for the publication in the same newspaper on September 10th last of a statement that an application was being made to a judge to have certain books and records of this corporation sequestered for the alleged reason that it had leaked out that the directors of the corporation including plaintiff, had arranged to destroy them.

Mr. Stevens further charges he was libelled in an editorial recently published in the Sun. An injunction against the Sun newspaper is also claimed in the writ which was filed by W. E. Burns, acting for Mr. Stevens.
