Three Government Candidates Chosen Yesterday

CONSERVATIVE CANDIDATE FOR PRINCE IS J. E. WYATT, K. C.

Mr. Wyatt Received the Nomination Yesterday at a Very Largely Attended Convention of Prince County Delegates Held in Summerside - Many Prominent Politicians Present.

(Special to The Guardian) The convention of Liberal Conservatives held in the Market Hall, Summerside, yesterday, was the most enthusiastic and largest attendance gathering of Conservatives in Prince County for some time. The convention was called for the purpose of nominating a candidate to contest the County in the coming election.

Mr. J. A. Hackett, President of the West Prince Liberal Conservative Association, and Mr. D. B. Macdonald, President of East Prince, jointly presided. There were also present Mr. J. A. Macdonald, Minister of the Meighen Cabinet, Hon. H. Frank MacPhee, Commissioner of Public Works, Sir Charles Daltouf, Mr. Wilfred Tanton, M. L. A., Hon. James A. MacNeill, Hon. A. F. Arsenault and others.

When the nominations were declared open the name of Mr. J. E. Wyatt, K. C., was moved by Mr. J. J. Krasnowski, Tignish, and seconded by Mr. Robert Crafer, Malpeque. The nomination of Mr. George D. Pope was moved by Mr. Nathaniel Pearson, Chelton, and seconded by U. D. McPhee, Cotnam. Mr. C. Shelton Sharpe was moved by Mr. P. J. Bulger and seconded by Mr. J. M. Ramsay. Mr. Sharpe said while he appreciated the honor of having his name placed in nomination he wished to withdraw.

Sir Henry Thornton Speaks At Brockville

BROCKVILLE, Ont., July 22.—"Every officer and employee of the Canadian National Railways should exercise his franchise as a Canadian citizen during the polls that are soon to decide what party shall be entrusted with the government of the Dominion, but each one nevertheless has at this time a good job on hand minding his own business and we expect the work of the railway to occupy the undivided attention of every member of the staff." This was one of the significant utterances made by Sir Henry Thornton, Chairman and President of the C. N. R. in addressing an audience of three thousand people gathered here this afternoon for the Brockville Reunion which has brought together this week former residents of the city from all sections of the United States and Canada.

It was Canadian National Railways day and parliamentary representatives on both sides of politics with the civic authorities and the Rotary Club co-operated to honor the head of the system.

65,000 Harvesters Wanted in West

ST. JOHN, July 22.—Word that the annual harvesters' excursion trains from the Maritime Provinces would leave here on Aug. 10 and 25 was received by local railway officials last night. The C. N. R. will run two excursion trains from the Maritimes, one leaving from Moncton and the other departing from the Union depot. This latter train will go to Montreal via the Valley route. Both C. N. R. trains will leave from Saint John.

It was reported last night that 65,000 harvesters will be in demand when the harvest season opens. It is expected that St. John and other Maritime points will send large numbers of workers to the prairie provinces next month.

P. R. A. ANNUAL PRIZE MEETING WILL BE HELD NEXT WEEK

Matches Will Begin Tuesday, July 27th, on Kensington Rifle Range - Splendid Program Prepared, and the Silver Black Fox Match Will be Shot for the First Time.

The Sixty-first Annual Prize Meeting of the Provincial Rifle Association of Prince Edward Island will be held next week on Kensington Rifle Range near Charlottetown. The matches start on Tuesday, July 27th at 8.30 and continue Wednesday and Thursday.

The first match fired will be the MacKinnon Drug Company match. This will be held on 200 yards. It will be followed by the Prowse match shot at 200, 500 and 600 yards, seven rounds at each range. In conjunction with the Prowse match there will be a team match in which teams of three men from any company of the active militia or military or civilian rifle club can compete. There is also a match for novices, or tyros, called the Judson Tyro match, which is shot in conjunction with the Prowse.

The Moore and McLeod match, seven rounds each at 200 yards and 500 yards, will be fired on Wednesday, followed by the Lieutenant Governor's match, seven rounds at 600 yards.

The Macdonald Briar match is this year only shot at one range, namely, the 600 yards and will be ten rounds.

The Corporation match or City of Charlottetown match will be as usual ten rounds fired at 500 yards. A new match fired this year will be the Silver Black Fox match, ten rounds fired at 500 yards.

The Governor General's Medals will be awarded to the members of the Association having the highest aggregate scores in the MacKinnon, Corporation, Prowse, Moore and McLeod, Macdonald Briar and

At the Rotary luncheon yesterday the speaker was Mr. F. C. Elford of the Poultry Division, Ottawa.

Mr. Elford who is a member of the Rotary Club of that city conveyed his greetings from that club.

He then gave an address on the "World's Poultry Conference" which is given herewith and said that arrangements were being made to have a number of delegates between one and two hundred visit Prince Edward Island, either coming or going, and Mr. Elford desired the assurance that they would be looked after and entertained while here.

President J. A. Webster of the Rotary Club said, although this was a matter mainly for the local government he felt sure that without consulting the other members that the Rotary and the Motor League will do all they can to assist in this matter. Rotarian R. L. Cotton was in the chair today and the guests were Rotarian Sidney Bonnell, Messrs George Lightizer, Roland Phillipson and A. B. Cosh. The musical program included excellent solos by Mr. Phillipson and Miss Whear both of whom were encored.

Rotarian C. H. Chandler on behalf of the picnic committee announced that the annual picnic will be held at the Cliff Hotel, Wednesday, Aug. 4th was fixed as the date.

Strange Monster Races Automobile

VERNON, B. C., July 22.—The strange monster which inhabits Okanagan Lake, and which has been reported several times recently, raced a motor car being driven along the shore road for several hundred yards, said J. L. Logie, manager of a local land company.

Mr. Logie describes the monster as having a head like a sheep, a dark colored body showing about five feet above the water, and about 15 feet long. Three other persons in the car with Mr. Logie said the monster raised a swell about a foot high and made the spray fly ahead of it as it cut through the water at approximately the same speed as the automobile.

Another auto party coming along noticed the commotion in the lake although otherwise the lake was calm.

Heat Wave Strikes Eastern States

CONSERVATIVE PREMIER WAS UNFURLED YESTERDAY

Hon. John H. Myers and Mr. John A. Messervey Nominated to Contest Queens. Largest Convention in History of Constituency. Address by the Premier, Hon. Mr. Myers, Mr. Messervey and Hon. Dr. MacMillan.

Hon. John H. Myers and Mr. John A. Messervey were declared elected amidst loud and prolonged applause.

Mr. Myers being called to the platform withheld acceptance of the nomination awaiting the consent of Premier Stewart to release him from the office of Minister of Agriculture which he at present holds.

The president, Mr. W. A. Stewart then called upon Premier Stewart to address the meeting. The Premier said that he was engaged in Provincial politics and was not going to discuss the federal situation. He referred to that "notorious organ" the Island Patriot, and its assertion that the provincial government was entitled to no credit for the securing of \$40,000 additional revenue from railway taxes. "We are not asking for credit," said Premier Stewart, "this matter was open when the Bell government was in power although nothing was done about it. It is strange that this grant comes with the recent interprovincial conference. Most of the other provinces had been receiving revenue from this source. As a result of the conference our island has received \$40,000 additional revenue. We got this because there are Conservative governments in line in the Maritime provinces. I want to say that I have more cabinet ability behind me, than any other premier who has ever held office in Prince Edward Island. I have been forced to give up my Minister of Public Works. He is one of the soundest-thinking business men in the province. He has been rewarded by being made a minister of the Crown. Now I have to give up my Minister of Agriculture. But we must make sacrifices and the thing we want to do now is win this Federal election. It is more vital than we appreciate. We can only have a stable government if there is a Conservative government at Ottawa. It is in the air that the Meighen Government will be returned to power. They are expecting a solid four from Prince Edward Island.

Hon. J. H. Myers after a few preliminary remarks dwelt upon the constitutional issue in the approaching election. In 1925 Mr. King went to the country with a policy on taxation, transportation, the tariff and reform of the Senate. None of these questions were brought up in Parliament after he had been badly defeated. Instead of resigning like a good sport, he wheedled the Progressives into supporting him. Did a Conservative or Conservative newspaper in Canada criticize the Governor-General for allowing Mr. King to carry on? Not one.

The day came for Mr. King to face defeat. Did he stand up in Parliament and take his medicine like a white man? No. He ran or fled the governor general for a dissolution which was quite naturally refused. Now the Liberals and Liberal press are kicking at the Governor-General's decision. We will ask you for your decision on September 14th.

Mr. John A. Messervey M. P., then took the platform amid tremendous applause. He confined his address to a few remarks on the necessity for the protection of Canada's farm products and fisheries. He concluded with a strong
