Seek Man's Story At Ancient Site South Of Baghdad

BAGHDAD, March 3 — (AP) — A joint United States archaeological expedition which started work in Iraq last year will be engaged for several seasons to come in the task of unfolding the story of the growth of man.

Dr. Donald E. McCown, who headed the combined expedition of the Oriental Institute of the University of Chicago and the University Museum of the University of Pennsylvania, said the limited results obtained in the introductory work last November and December "have been most promising."

The group, which plans to resume work in full capacity next season, is pursuing its study of man's early years on the site of Nippur, now known as Nuffar, a short distance from Afek in the Diwanlyah Liwa (province) about 100 miles south of Baghdad.

The ancient site of Nippur is one of the great landmarks in the early civilization of Iraq (Mesopotamia). The history of Nippur is a long one, running from the prehistoric Al-Ubad period (at least 6,000 years ago) down to the 10th century A.D. Its greatest importance was in the third millennium B. C., during the early Sumerian and immediately following periods.

Although Nippur was never a political capital of southern Mesopotamia it was, in a sense, the religious capital of the land. It was the home of Enlil, the chief god in the Sumerian pantheon, at that remote period.

Nippur became less important in the second millennium B. C. with the rise of Babylon, when Murdok became chief god, but it continued to be a large and important city. The present remains cover about 180 acres.

The American expedition which started work last fall is not the first American group to undertake excavations in this important area. Nippur was the site of the first archaeological project in Iraq more than 60 years ago.

Cuneiform Tablets

From 1888 to 1890 the University of Pennsylvania had a field party there and Nippur became famous for the large number of tablets in cuneiform writing discovered in

Famous Guide Books Make Reappearance

HAMBURG, March 1 — (Reuters) — The famous red guide books published by Karl Baedeker and known to tourists the world over, are to reappear.

Karl Baedeker, great-grandson of the founder of the firm, has been granted a licence in Hamburg to re-start this world famous business which was disrupted first by the war, then by the destruction of all archives and stores in the air raids and finally by the fact that its seat was in Leipzig, in the Russian zone, where it was found impossible to make a fresh start.

Although the firm published a small guide to Leipzig last year, the first real new post-war Baedeker will be a volume on Schleswig-Holstein where Karl Baedeker has been living since the war.

A relatively modest beginning, the volume on Schleswig-Holstein will contain 200 drawings of the arms and other characteristics of the province. It is due to appear early this year. The edition will be limited to 10,000 copies.
