Dyed Lace Makes Effective Ball Gowns—Red is Much Worn.

Red, both in light and dark shades, is very much worn this winter, and pretty red cloth 'gowns' are trimmed with flat braid, bias velvet or fringe.

Black silk tassels appear, plentifully besprinkled, on many an otherwise

plaid gown, and they are a most effective mode of trimming.

Narrow bands of fur are much used, even on very thin materials, such as chiffon, voile and crepe de chine.

The modified rever is a feature of dress which is being revived even on evening bodices.

Dyed lace makes effective ball gowns, and this is especially good in lace dyed brown chiffon and bits of applique left even here and there.

Wide girdles of flowered silk are quite the thing for girlish dresses. There are charming materials for coats. The vigognes with hairy tufts or a scattered sprinkling of white hairs make up quite smartly with stitched strappings of self colored cloth and pipings and linings of silk or satin, while the new "fur" plushes are a boon to those who cannot afford the real thing.
