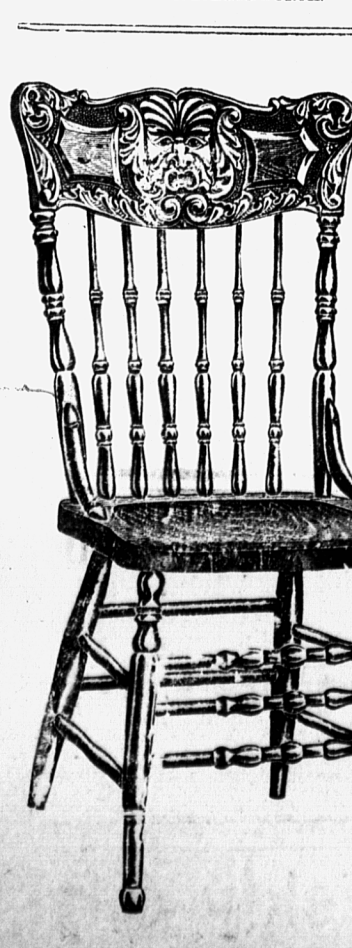

THE COMING CONFERENCE.

Recent despatches indicate that very soon matters concerning the relations of Canada and the United States will come up for consideration. In this regard nothing is more striking than the comments of the leading newspapers of the Republic when referring to the subject. The matter is treated in an altogether different spirit to that which characterized the opinions of the press of the United States not so many years ago. It is not long since one of the writers most representative of the best class of American people in referring to the teaching of peace speaking of the feeling with which Great Britain was regarded, said "There is not the slightest doubt that the feeling of antagonism to Great Britain which was so deep-seated in this country until a few years ago had its taproot in the teaching of history in the schools. The old accounts of the Revolution, prepared by men of very partial views, based on most imperfect information, tended to inflame youthful feeling and to plant deep in youthful minds a sense of injustice. Under the teachings of the old text-books most children grew up with the idea that their country was always right and other countries always wrong, and that international intercourse consisted chiefly in each country taking care of what belonged to it with insistent suspicion and vigilance and constant readiness for war. Children are now taught, in a more intelligent age, that the American Revolution was a part of the great English revolution. They know that there was widespread sympathy in Great Britain through the whole of that long war, and that it was conducted, not by the people of Great Britain, but by a King and a party with whom the people were constantly struggling and who were in the end defeated. The American Revolution was a part of the popular struggle for liberty by the English-speaking race. The changes which have been made in the statements of facts regarding the American Revolution may be taken as an illustration of the changes which are taking place in all histories for young people touching controverted points."

THE CUBAN REVOLT.

Cuba is disturbed. A revolution has assumed shape and grown to dimensions which have made it part of the world's news. Incidentally some lives have been lost in the battles which have already been fought between government troops and insurgents.

The trouble with Cuba appears to be that there are in that island too many volatile generalissimos and captains men who acquired rank in the war with Spain, who are now out of employment. If these bravos would, as the New York Times plithily remarks, go to work raising sugar cane instead of the other Cain they would prove themselves to be better patriots.

It is altogether probable, if the revolt goes much further that the United States which has much at stake in Cuba, shall have to intervene to keep the Cubans quiet.

RUSSIA.

The red hand of the Russian revolutionaries which has been out of sight of late, is again playing the leading part in the politics of that unfortunate country. The period of knouting, imprisonment, and banishing which has actively gone on by the orders of the government has been interrupted by the most serious and bloody massacre yet charged to the party of revolution. The assassination of general Min and the attempted assassination of the Russian Premier seem to denote the resuming of the struggle between the Czar and the people. Which ever side succeeds the outlook promises a reign of terror and misery for the Russian people.

The fact that a girl was yesterday, at the Police Court, fined \$5 for loitering on the public streets, directs attention to the fact that many girls and silly young women frequent our streets at night after the hour of 9 o'clock. They are particularly noticeable about Queen Square and along Queen and Water Streets where they behave in a manner not creditable to themselves nor the reputation of this City. It ought to be possible for the police to bring about a change in this condition of affairs.

INDIAN CHIEF'S ELOQUENT NOTES

LONDON, August 25.—Quaint letters from the Indian chiefs who recently laid their grievances before the King, make interesting reading:

The first relates to their progress through Canada:

"We have seen," they say, "great many countries that we never seen before. Every man that sees us treat us good, and every station we came to Indians are there waiting for us, bidding us goodbyes, and shakehandsing us, and wishing us good luck."

"Indians of the Northwest Territories are different from us. They wear blankets and you can't tell the women from the men. They all have long hair, and they all wear the native clothing, such as buckskin clothing and can't talk English or Chinnook."

"The only tribe nearly like us is the Blackfoot Indians. And the Manitoba Indians are really like us, well clothed and everything good on them. We, all the Indian chiefs, are well pleased of our treatments."

Another letter parlakes of the nature of a statement of grievances. It is a pathetic appeal to Sir Wilfrid Laurier, evidently "done in English" by a different hand from that which translated the specimen we quote above, and it is eloquent in its simplicity:

"We are being restricted on every hand by the white man's laws, and our people are getting tired of being fined and imprisoned for getting the necessary food for their families."

"We have not sufficient pasture for our horses and cattle, and if we turn them on the roads they are impounded and sold by the white people, and this is very annoying to us."

"Then in the dry parts of our country where irrigation has to be practiced in order to obtain crops, we find that the white people try to take all the water from us."
