ALL ELECTED WITHOUT OPPOSITION

By-Election Seats Following appointment To Bennett cabinet Went By Acclamation

ST. PETERS, N.S., Sept. 2.—Hon. E. N. Rhodes, Minister of Fisheries was elected by acclamation today to represent the constituency of Richmond—West Cape Breton in the House of Commons. No other candidate had appeared to contest the by-election when the time for receiving nominations closed today. All of the members of the Hon. R. B. Bennett administration have now been elected without opposition in the by-elections following their appointments to the Cabinet.

PILOT DROWNS IN LAKE ONT.

TORONTO, Ont., Sept. 2.—A pilot of the Royal Air Force, whose name has not yet been learned, was drowned when his plane nose-dived into Lake Ontario in front of the Canadian National Exhibition. The flier had been circling over the lake course in preparation for the air races to be staged at the exhibition this evening. Life guards and sea-planes sped to the scene and began dragging for the pilot. It was believed another man in the plane escaped serious injury.

Straw In Lung; Is Getting Well

May Be Held On Murder Charge

Member Of Mounted Police Shoots Woman While Alleged To Have Been Intoxicated.

DAUPHIN, Man., Sept. 2.—Mrs. Sophie Light, 26 shot yesterday by Constable J. Pirt of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, died early today and a charge of murder has been laid against the Constable. Pirt was arraigned in Dauphin Police Court today and remanded without pleading. Whether the trial will proceed on a murder charge or the count reduced to manslaughter has not yet been decided.
According to eyewitnesses of the shooting, Mrs. Light, with her husband and a friend, had attended an interprovincial picnic six miles from here. Constable Pirt was on traffic duty at the picnic grounds. The Constable is alleged to have accepted several drinks from the Light party and to have been intoxicated. After some "kidding" the policeman is reported to have drawn his gun and fired one shot, the bullet striking Mrs. Light in the abdomen.

MONOPLANE ATTACHED

MONTREAL, Que., Sept. 2.—Prospect of a further delay in the projected trans-Atlantic flight of the Bellanca monoplane Columbia from Montreal to Croydon, England, loomed today as the giant airplane lay under seizure at the St. Hubert Airport. The machine was attached Monday on its arrival here from Toronto, at the instance of Roger Q. Williams, aviator of New York City, who flew the Columbia from New York City to Montreal recently. With the Columbia is also seized the Triad, also owned by the same company. The two machines are now in custody of an R. C. M. P. officer at St. Hubert Airport. Williams has a \$1,000 claim against Charles Levine, owner of the Columbia.

TO HELP THE BURNT OUT VETERAN

Ontario Appoints Col. Wm. Rhodes To The Specific Duties of Caring For And Developing The Interests of "Returned men."

TORONTO, Ont., Sept. 2.—"We are trying to see if we cannot do something in a practical way, that will be of real advantage to the unfortunate veterans who can perhaps, show no visible scar or blemish, but whose spirit has been broken and whose soul has been burned," said Hon. G. Howard Ferguson addressing the labor delegates and officials at yesterday's directors luncheon at the C. N. E.; in announcing the appointment of Colonel William Rhodes to the specific duties of caring for and developing the interests of "returned men" among employers of labor throughout Ontario. "I look forward," concluded the speaker, "to the Province of Ontario in this direction adding to the lustre of its record for what it has endeavored to do for the men who fought for its free existence, 'burnt out veterans.' "In the Great War one half of the Canadian force were enlisted from this province. As a result, in this province we have suffered more than any other part of Canada. I don't necessarily mean in terms of casualties, although every fourth boy from Canada who today lies across the ocean knew Ontario's skies and a huge proportion from this great city."

MOVER AND SECONDER ANNOUNCED

By Premier Bennett At The Conclusion of Cabinet Meeting Yesterday.

OTTAWA, Sept. 2.—F. Turnbull, Conservative member-elect for Regina, will be the mover and Onesime Gannon, Conservative member-elect for Dorchester, Que., will be the seconder of the Address in reply to the Speech From the Throne. Announcement of the selection was made by Premier R. B. Bennett tonight following the conclusion of a meeting of the Cabinet.
Both members-elect, who are newcomers to the Dominion Parliament, defeated Ministers of the former Liberal administration in the recent general election. Mr. Turnbull defeated Hon. C. A. Dunning, former Minister of Finance, while Mr. Gannon defeated Hon. Lucien Cannon, former Solicitor General. A further council is scheduled for tomorrow.
OTTAWA, Ont., Sept. 2.—The new speaker of the House of Commons for the coming parliament is certain to be George Black, Conservative member-elect for Yukon, the deputy speaker will be Armand Lavergne, Conservative member-elect for Montmagny, Que. Official intimation of these selections is expected shortly.

CHICAGO HAS \$1,000,000 FIRE

CHICAGO, Sept. 2.—Rain early today checked Chicago's most disastrous fire in three years, after it had caused approximately \$1,000,000 damage to a candy company, a boat factory and a Great Lakes Steamship Line commissary building.
Explosions of eight storage tanks sprayed the district with flaming gasoline and oil. For a time the fires threatened to spread over a wide section of the Lake Michigan waterfront. Firemen fought the flames from both land and water. All workers had left the damaged building before the fires started but four firemen were injured seriously.

Balloon Lands In Mountains

ADAMS, Mass., Sept. 2.—The Belgica, Belgium, entry in the 19th International Gordon Bennett balloon race landed in the mountains here today shortly after 4 o'clock E. S. T. The balloon was piloted by Captain Ernest De Muyter. His aide landed from the basket in order to lighten the load before it landed and was reported lost in the mountains.

Famous French Flyers Succeed In Trans Ocean Hop

Coste And Bellonte In First Non-stop Flight Ever Made From Paris To New York—Lindbergh Welcomes Airmen.

VALLEY STREAM, N. Y., Sept. 2.—Back tracking the Lindbergh trail between New York and Paris, Dieudonne Coste and Maurice Bellonte completed the first non-stop flight ever made from Paris to New York today, landing here at 6.12.30, E.S.T., just 37 hours, 18 minutes and 30 seconds after leaving the French Capital.

The Frenchmen made the perilous westward crossing in less than four hours more than it took Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh to fly from New York to Paris in 1927. Colonel Lindbergh was here to extend warm congratulations to the first man ever to fly without stop from continental Europe to the continent of North America.

Great Reception
The air was full of planes as Coste and Bellonte flashed into view in their scarlet plane marked with a white question mark. A dozen other planes took off as the Frenchmen came into sight, but with perfect handling, France's premier aviator brought his big sesqui-plane down through the rising ships and effected a perfect landing.
With an escort of motorcycle police, the red plane that had just made aviation history and achieved a feat that has cost ten lives in previous attempts, taxied slowly across the field and stopped by a hangar where the airmen were taken to talk over the radio and tell their experiences to newspapermen.
Although the general public was thus excluded from the field proper, special passes had been issued to several hundred persons having one connection or other with the flight, and as soon as the Question Mark stopped, it was surrounded by a crowd which police had difficulty in dispersing. The darkening field boomed with flashlights as the fliers climbed from the open cockpits of their famous plane in which they already have made a world's record for long distance.

Members of Parliament Will Be Paid By The Day While Considering Unemployment

\$4,000 Sessional Indemnity Requires 51 Days; Will Receive \$25 Per Day.

OTTAWA, Sept. 2.—When the special session of Parliament opens a week from today to deal with unemployment, the members, appropriately enough, will be paid on the day labor plan.
The sessional indemnity for members of the Canadian House of Commons is \$4,000, but to receive this, the session must last 51 days. If that minimum is not reached, the members receive \$25 per day.
Various forecasts have been made on the probable length of the special session but all have been far below the 51-day mark. It is practically certain that it will not last that long, which means that the members will not be paid the full sessional indemnity.

SEVERAL FACTORS

The length of the session will be governed by several factors, chief among them being the Government's proposals to relieve unemployment and their reception by the Opposition. The Government headed by Hon. R. B. Bennett, of course, has sufficient numbers to outvote all other groups but there are many ways of dodging a division until such a time as the Opposition desires one.
There have been veiled stories on Parliament Hill that the Government is prepared to resort to closure if its legislative program meets stout opposition. It is some years since this has been utilized in Canada.

HEARST IS EXPELLED FROM FRANCE

American Publisher Ordered Out of Republic Because of Hostile Attitude of Hearst Newspapers.

PARIS, Sept. 2.—William Randolph Hearst, American publisher left Paris for London yesterday within an hour after an expulsion order had been served against him by an agent of the police.
Hearst's expulsion was confirmed by the Quai D'Orsay, the French foreign office. Distinct reason for the expulsion order were given as the generally hostile attitude of the Hearst newspapers toward France. The Prefecture stated that the order had been prepared for a long time, but that officials had not been able to serve it until yesterday afternoon.
though its application has been threatened on more than one recent occasion. Time alone, however, will tell whether this move on the Government's part will be thought necessary.
