COUSIN OF POET PASSES

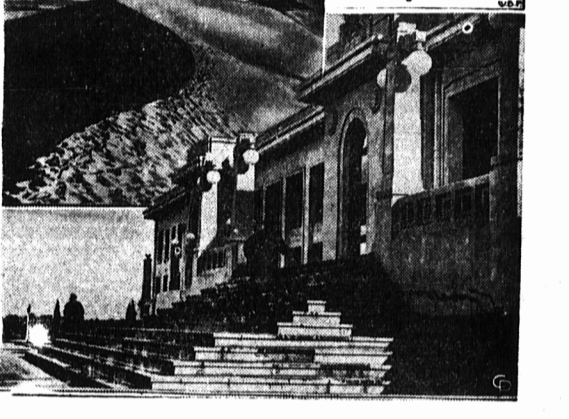

Adopt Trade Restrictions For Safe Guard

(C. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) MONTREAL, Nov. 18.—Although forced to adopt restrictive measures to safeguard the economic life of Canada, the Dominion Government, Hon. C. H. Cahan, K. C., Secretary of State, is ready and anxious to increase the country's trade with foreign countries on a basis of reciprocal mutual advantage.

Speaking last night before his electors of St. Lawrence-St. George, Mr. Cahan dwelt at length on the commercial relationships of Canada and the United States and stated that any improvement in the trade between the two countries depended upon the extent to which the United States is willing to let down the barriers against Canadian products, thereby restoring reciprocal trade to an equitable basis.
