An Excellent Account Will Doubtless be Rendered by Island Teams.

So general is the interest in the small arm that we are apt to overlook our more important and larger armaments. Were we threatened from the sea-board our riflemen might prevent a landing while the enemy's heavy guns would be doing us material injury were it not that our artillerymen would soon engage their attention and hold the invaders at a respectful distance. To the citizen who is abreast of the times the meeting of the big guns and gunners next week in Quebec, is full of interest. There he will see how soon heavy ordnance when placed hors de combat may be replaced in position or if disabled at once replaced by another piece. As these guns weigh tons it means science welded to force, intelligence to dynamite. Then, too, these pieces hurl their huge projectiles miles. The small arm man prides himself on hitting his aim at 800 yards, multiply this by three and the heavy gunner is only at his short distance, by five and you find him disconsolate if after his flight of nearly three miles, his projectile falls outside the narrow limit assigned for hits. So we may well speed our boys with kindly wishes and doubt not the recent successful practice shifts mean that, accidents avoided, they return from Quebec victorious.
