Professor E. J. McMillan for the past three years Secretary of the Department of Agriculture in this Province and teacher in Prince of Wales College, leaves to-morrow morning for Bloemfontein via Rimouski and Liverpool, where

He will enter upon the work of Superintendent of Agriculture to which position he has been appointed. Mr. McMillan will be associated with W. J. Palmer also of this city.

Professor McMillan graduated from the Guelph Agricultural College in 1900 after a very successful course leading his class and taking the degree of B. S. C. from the University of Toronto. The next year, in April 1901 he was appointed to the position which he has held for the past three years. T. C. James yesterday received the following despatch from a friend of the late W. D. Ross who was drowned in Vancouver. Saw Ross Sunday evening. He was well and bright. Everything connected with him was in excellent condition and his prospects were very encouraging. His body was found near Royal City Wharf. He must have either stumbled or walked over in darkness.

CHARLES B. Webster, foreman boiler maker for the Charlottetown Foundry & Machine Co. leaves for Summerside this morning as a witness on the McKay vs. McKinnon boiler explosion case at Coleman.

By a telegram received yesterday afternoon by F. L. Hazard from R. J. Young, Toronto, Secretary of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association it is learned that the Association's trip to Newfoundland has been indefinitely postponed. The excursionists were to call at Summerside and Charlottetown.

At the Police Court yesterday four drunks were dealt with as follows:—Frank McAtee \$2 or 10 days, T. Bonanan \$2 or 10 days, John McLeod \$4 or 15 days. Daniel McCallum for using abusive and profane language to P. C. Brown was fined \$5 or 30 days. The Court met again in the afternoon to hear the case of W. W. Harper vs Job Ward on a charge of using abusive and threatening language. The case took up the greater part of the afternoon and resulted in Ward being fined \$5 and giving security for \$300 to keep the peace for one year. Another case of Mrs. Newberry vs Mrs. Inglis for assault was dismissed.

TO STAND TRIAL FOR MURDER

GLACE BAY, June 15.—The preliminary enquiry into the McRae homicide is concluded and the coroner's inquest is finished. The verdict of the Coroner's Jury was that the deceased came to his death at the hands of his son.

The evidence brought out though varying in few details was conclusive, and John McRae was committed to the Supreme Court on the charge of murder and taken into Sydney last night.

SCHOLARSHIPS AT CAMBRIDGE UNIVERSITY.

The announcement has been made that a scholarship will be established at Christ's College, Cambridge, to be awarded to a McGill student. Two graduates of the former college have made the gift which provides \$400 annually for three years. It is awarded upon the following conditions:

1. That the scholar be selected from among the students of McGill University, Montreal.
2. That the scholar be chosen by the principal and professors of McGill, but not by competitive examination.
3. That the scholarship may be held on any subject taught at the University of Cambridge.
4. That the scholarship be called a Canadian scholarship.

When asked about awarding the scholarship, Dr. Adams, who is a friend of one of the donors, said that a brilliant student in any faculty of the university was eligible.

It will probably be impossible to select a candidate for next autumn, but it is hoped that the first Canadian scholar will go into residence at Christ's during 1905.
