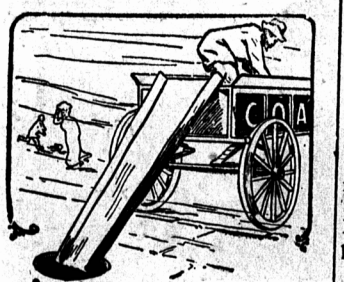

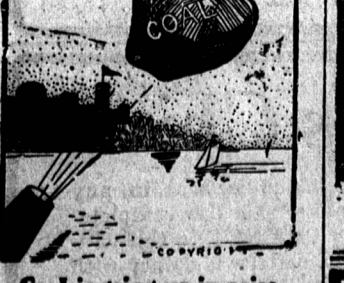

Holmer has recently arrived from England, where he claims to have taken the measure of all the best ones and feels sure that he can clean up with Cameron on this occasion.

We said in our issue of two weeks ago that there was apparently a combine among the P.E.I. Schooners in respect to the prices they ask for produce. Now we will prove it. In Saturday's Charlottetown, P.E.I. "Patriot" and Charlottetown, P.E.I., "Guardian," the prices of produce are given in detail, and with the heading that these prices are corrected each day to date and that these are the "retail" prices. We will take one item which will show all as they are all alike. Take the price of turnips, e.g. The retail prices of turnips in these two papers are given from six market centres in P. E. I., and the prices range from 11 cents per bushel up to 16 cents per bushel the highest price. When we read this we went down to the wharf here and went to five different schooners and asked the price of turnips, each and everyone without exception quoted 35 cents per bushel. We said to one schooner man: You fellows must be in a combine. After a while he admitted it, giving as an alleged reason that the price of things in the New Glasgow grocery shops were in a combine also. We proved to him that that was untrue. Now to our mind the fact that these schooner men are making over 100 per cent, certainly does not entitle them to any leniency. The paltry \$2.00 fee that they pay for the privilege of selling here in competition to our own meat men and grocers and farmers should be increased to at least \$100.00. If they were selling in competition with one another the case might be different, but a combine in order to boost up prices over 100 per cent, does not call for any consideration. The police should at least collect the limit of taxes from each Schooner.—Westville Exc.

The Maritime Baptist of Nov. 20 contains the following: It has already been reported that Rev. A. J. Vinning, as the agent of the Baptist World Alliance, appealed to the churches of the Maritime Provinces, at the recent session of the Convention, at Moncton for \$5,000 as their share of the \$150,000 necessary to establish and endow a Theological College at St. Peterburg.

A few words may be added by way of supplementing the report to this date. The immediate response to Mr. Vinning's appeal was an offering, in cash and pledges, to some \$2,250. The Convention appointed a committee, consisting of Rev. Z. L. Fash, Charlottetown, E. M. Sipprell, P.E.I., and the undersigned to have charge of the work, and to endeavor to increase the fund to \$5,000 during the next two years. The committee organized with E. M. Sipprell, treasurer, and F. H. Beals, secretary. Later, Rev. E. D. Webber; Rev. J. D. Spidel and Rev. A. H. Whitman were added to the committee. The cash was taken over by Mr. Sipprell; the pledges given by Moncton subscribers were left with H. E. Cross, in the expectation that some one in the vicinity might be employed to collect them; and the remainder were retained by the secretary, who will tabulate them and carry out the wishes of the committee in the matter of their collection. In the meantime any subscription may be forwarded to E. M. Sipprell, St. John, N. B., who will give receipt. A meeting of the committee is called for the 19th inst., at Berwick, when plans for the prosecution of the work will be considered.
