TAFT NOTES SETTING SUN BUT HE ALSO SEES RISING MOON

WASHINGTON, March 3—Having abandoned hope of seeing reciprocity passed by the present congress, President Taft late to-day, after returning from his afternoon walk, declared that he had noted the setting sun, but that he also had seen a new moon in the heavens. The president has not yet decided when he will issue his proclamation calling the new congress together, nor has the date been fixed. Despite the fact that the measure which, above all others, he desired to see passed at this session, did not become law, the president was rejoicing to-night over the large number of bills he favored which have been passed.

Much has been accomplished by the present session he feels, which will be of lasting benefit to the country. He had no unkind words for the dying congress because it could not see its way clear to pass his reciprocity measure. He is waiting for the "new moon" of the coming congress to fulfill his desires in that direction. Canadian reciprocity sentiment in the senate was not subjected to a test to-day. It was thought that Senator Stone might precipitate a state that would disclose the attitude of the senate. Early in the forenoon he had said that he would move to take up the consideration of the McCall bill to carry into effect the provisions of the agreement with Canada. The passage of the Sundry civil bill, he said, would be followed by such a motion from him. The sundry civil bill passed, but the Missouri senator did not mention reciprocity.

In private conversation the senator explained his failure to move the consideration of the McCall bill. "I spoke somewhat imperatively in the senate," he said, "but upon second thought I concluded that it would not be wise to make that motion. I had learned that there would be a motion on the table to further the appropriation bills. The vote on the motion to table would have been in the interest of expedition of routine business, but still it would have been constructed as a vote against reciprocity. I felt that as a friend of the measure I could not afford to place it at such a disadvantage, and I should be especially misapprehended in Canada."

AT LAST PEARY GETS RECOGNITION

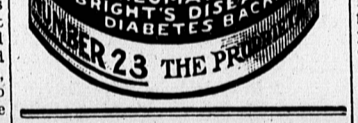
WASHINGTON, Mar. 3—The plans of the friends of Captain R. E. Peary, to secure congressional recognition of his Polar achievements progressed rapidly today when the house by a vote of 154 to 34 passed an amended senate bill according him honors. The original senate bill authorized the president to appoint Peary rear admiral in the navy, to be varied as an additional number in grade, and to place him upon the retired list at the highest pay in the grade. The house amended this so as to authorize the president to place him on the retired list of the corps of civil engineers, with the rank of rear admiral. To date from April 6, 1909, and so as to tender the thanks of congress for "his Arctic explorations, resulting in reaching the North Pole." When the measure was brought up, Mr. Macon, of Arkansas, tried to fight it off but he was overriden, and the bill went to conference. The senate later in the evening concurred in the house amendments and passing the bill, which makes it law as signed. Under this bill Peary will be placed "on the retired list of the corps of civil engineers, with the rank of rear admiral, to date from April 6, 1909, with the highest retired pay to that grade under existing laws." That is the date upon which Peary attained his goal.

DREADNOUGHTS DOOMED

LONDON, March 2—Westcott Abell, professor of naval architecture at the University of Liverpool, in a lecture at the University today, predicted the abandonment of heavy plating above the water-line of warships and the eventual disappearance of the Dreadnought type. The future battleship, he said, would be an oil driven, semi-submersible protected by a thick horizontal deck and under water armor strong enough to resist torpedoes. It would be armed with big guns on high towers, would have submerged torpedo tubes and be difficult to hit or sink.

BARON GETS AN APOLOGY

NEW YORK, Mar. 3—Richard von Arkov, the Austrian landholder who says he is a baron, walked into Police Court today with a grand larceny charge hanging over him. He walked out a few minutes later with the charge not only dismissed, but with the satisfaction of having been proffered an apology by the man who had instituted the proceedings against him. Von Arkov was arrested Wednesday night on the charge made by Julio S. Jaron, Cuban vice-consul in this city, that the Austrian had wrongfully appropriated a pair of platinum crucibles valued at \$900.
