FAST WORK BY THE PROVINCIAL POLICE—Two young men from Charlottetown while parked on the Norwood Road, East Royalty, early last night had a rather unique experience. While sitting in their car accompanied by two ladies, they suddenly found themselves surrounded by five men and the car securely blocked with rails, after which the "attacking" party withdrew some distance to open a heavy barrage of shots. After the smoke of battle cleared away, it was found that much glass on the car was broken, and one of the ladies had sustained a severe cut over the right eye. The driver of the car was also cut on the cheek with flying glass. On returning to Charlottetown the party reported the matter to Commissioner Trainor and Constable McKinley of the Provincial Police at 10:35. They could give little information to the officers, who nevertheless proceeded to the scene of the disgraceful occurrence and by clever work soon had two of the five under lock and key. The other three will also appear before Magistrate Shaw this morning. It is understood that this sort of work has been going on throughout the summer, one gentleman being almost blinded when a person threw a shovelful of lime in his face. The Provincial Police are to be heartily commended for prompt and successful apprehension of all such offenders. If this practice is curbed at the beginning, much more serious results will be averted.

"His Last Haul" Excellent Drama

Al Roscoe, one of the screen's most capable artists in the interpretation of difficult roles, went to the classics to find a model for the detective he plays in "His Last Haul," FBO's thrilling drama of the underworld, now showing at the Capitol theatre.

Standardization Murray Harbour Branch Tomorrow

Today will see the last of the narrow gauge trains in this province when the Murray Harbour train leaves for the Southern terminal.

At daylight tomorrow the work of widening the narrow gauge—the last in this division—from the Hillsboro Bridge to Lake Verde and Murray Harbour will commence and it is expected will be completed by Sunday before dark.

Three gangs of men will be employed; one on the Charlottetown side of the bridge working across; the second on the Southport side working towards Lake Verde and the third at Lake Verde working towards Charlottetown.

The work will be more difficult than the average citizen imagines. This branch has no "third rail" as has been the case on the other parts of the road when the heavier wide gauge rail was laid outside the "third rail." In this case all that was necessary was the removing of the inside or lighter rail.

In this case the two rails must be lifted clear of the ties and removed to an equal distance on each side then spiked down again.

The rails used will be narrow gauge and arrangements will be made for heavy freight for points south to go around by Pisiquid. Passenger and light freight will be handled by lighter locomotives and will go over the bridge.

Between 300 and 400 men will be employed in widening the tracks and nothing is to prevent the work being commenced except a heavy downpour of rain. Once the work is commenced however nothing will interfere with the completion.

WON CANADIAN FOOTBALL GAME GOLF CH'SHIP WITH MT. A. IN PROSPECT

(Canadian Press) MONTREAL, Que., Sept. 26—The Canadian women's closed golf championship moved to Montreal today after a lengthy sojourn in Toronto, when Miss Marjorie Kirkham, Forest Hills, defeated Miss Cecile Smith, Toronto Golf Club, in the 18 hole final one up over the course of the Mount Bruno Country Club. Miss Kirkham, who is the local city and district title holder, thus became Canada's premier woman golfer in succession to Miss Ada MacKenzie of Toronto, who was eliminated by Miss Smith in the quarter final round.

It is hoped that Ernie Smith, now at Hunter River, and Art Woolner at Rustico, will be present at today's practice.

ST. LOUIS AND ATHLETICS IN WORLD SERIES

(Canadian Press) NEW YORK, N. Y., Sept. 26—It is the Cardinals versus the Athletics in the World's Series. "Gabby" Street's Red Birds qualified to uphold the honor of the National League against the Philadelphia Athletics, American League champions, in this year's baseball classic by slugging out a 10 to 5 victory over the Pittsburgh Pirates and clinching the 1930 league pennant, the St. Louis club's third in the last five seasons.

MONTREAL AND TORONTO TIED

(Canadian Press) MASSENA, N. Y., Sept. 26—The Toronto Maple Leafs today defeated the Montreal Royals 5 to 4 here in the fourth game of their post-season series for the Canadian baseball championship. The win for the Queen City team left the series tied at two games each as yesterday's disputed game at Sherbrooke, Que., was awarded to the Royals.

ISLAND CADETS INCREASE

With the formation of two new Cadet Corps in Prince Edward Island the Province should have good prospects of winning the Earl Grey Challenge Trophy for this school year. The Trophy, a beautifully executed Statue in silver of Saint George and the Dragon, was presented to Canada by Earl Grey when he was Governor General, and is awarded annually to the Province having the largest number of cadets in proportion to boys attending school. It has been won for some years past by the Province of Quebec, with the Island in fourth place for the past three years, but it is expected that P.E.I. with an increase of 12 per cent in the number of its cadets during the school year just terminated will be placed even higher when the 1929-30 results are known.

The new Corps in process of formation are situated at Georgetown High School and at O'Leary. The Georgetown Corps is under the instruction of Mr. H. N. Murphy, while Mr. H. L. Henderson is in charge of O'Leary. Both of these gentlemen obtained their Grade "A" Certificates last summer at Aldershot, N.S., and are being assisted in the initial steps of organization by S.M.I. Irlam, the Physical Training Instructor of the Prince of Wales College, Charlottetown.

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The character role of David Harvey, a reckless and impulsive young crook is played by Robert Ames, well known on the speaking stage, and who has become extremely popular on the audible screen by his fine work in Gloria Swanson's recent Fox Movietone production "Nix On Dam-" in which he was co-featured with William Harrison. Ames enacts his rather difficult role in "Double Cross Roads" with sympathy and understanding that is indeed refreshing.
