much news. I was going to drop a line before but it is rather hard to write sitting up in bed. As you can see by the above address I am back in England and believe me it feels fine after that horrible Belgium with its mud. My head is getting on fine but I have a touch of pleurisy and am not allowed out of bed yet. I haven't heard a letter every day but a month's time I expect to be back in the trenches again. My birthday was last Wednesday and I got presents from most of the nurses and also a birthday cake. They use us Canadians fine in the hospitals here. There is another Canadian here beside me. I was not acquainted with him before but that doesn't make much difference so long as he is from Canada. A lot of my chums got hit on the same day as I did but they are scattered around everywhere and I haven't seen any of them since. The chap that was beside me got killed instantly as it got him in the heart. Altogether my platoon lost twenty out of fifty and they still keep killing them off. Well how is everybody down in P. E. I? I would like to be back there and hope I shall be for my next birthday. Well Marion as I told you before I have no news that would interest you so will close for now. With love from JACK.

I suppose you know that I have been wounded and strange to say on the very day and about the same hour as your letter was posted. As you may see by the above address, I am in England again and in an hospital. The wound on my head is nearly all healed but I am troubled with my side. There is quite a bald spot on my head now and there is going to be a scar on the crown of my head.

I haven't had a letter from home

since I was wounded. I guess theirs have been lost. Is Wilmot in Charlottetown yet or have they moved? I wish they would come over here. I am glad Wilmot joined the Artillery for they do not have it so hard. And so Bruce has joined, has he? Is there anybody else from around there? Do you know if the 56th Battalion has come over yet? I have been trying to find out but I can't. You know John MacEwen is in it and I would like to see him as it is really a treat to see anyone from home and get the news. Now Ronie, I don't think I have any

news that would interest you so I will close. Remember me to grandpa and grandma and all. With love from JOHN.
