**THRESHERS WASH SANDS FOR GOLD**  
RIMBEY, Alta., July 30—Washing sands for gold near this town, 10 miles south of Edmonton, has been found to be quite a pastime here since University of Alberta assays showed gold thus gleaned was from a richer deposit of very high quality.

Prospecting over an area of about 3,000 feet square have uncovered good deposits of gold, and the sand assayed as of the ruby quality, which carries highest percentage of the metal.

LeRoy and Lesley Rimbeey and J. W. Wright have been prospecting and are using an eight-horse-power engine with a couple of threshing machine water-pumps attached to wash the sands.

Farmers hauling sand from a pit nearby have upon killing poultry found nuggets of gold in their crops.

**Advances Claim To Large Houston Estate**

MELBOURNE, Australia, July 30—(AP)—Mrs. Annie Houston, a claimant to the estimated \$5,000,000 (\$24,937,500) estate left by the late Lady (Robert) Houston in England, died here today.

Mrs. Houston was an elderly woman in poor circumstances. She advanced her claim only three days ago, on the grounds that her husband, George Muir Houston, was a nephew of Sir Robert Houston, who amassed the huge fortune in shipping.

Lady Houston, who died intestate in December, left her estate to Miss Juliana Hoare, who died before she did.

**RUNAWAY BLIMP WAS NOT FOUND**

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., Aug 1—(CP)—Many and varied are the sagas of ships that have left port never to be seen again; but on May 15, 1919 Newfoundland, scene of many 'first things' in aviation, was the scene of what might be called the first saga of ocean flying.

The United States Blimp C-15, commanded by Captain Coll, was moored at Pleasantville, near here, in preparation for a transatlantic flight.

In a high wind all the crew but two were called out to secure the moorings which were, despite their efforts, carried away by the gale. When there was but one line hold-

ing the airship the two remaining members of the crew left her with difficulty. Then the blimp broke loose and headed out to sea.

A destroyer in port here immediately put out to sea in search of the truant airship but after clearing a coast of Newfoundland, C-15 was never seen again, nor was any trace of her ever found.

## In Memoriam

MR. WILLIAM E. NOONAN

On May 29th a much respected citizen in the person of William E. Noonan died in Summerside at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Chas. McIvor. Mr. Noonan had been ill only for a short period and being under proper efficient care was supposed to be convalescing favorably and therefore the shock of his sudden passing away was surely an unexpected blow to his family and many other friends.

He was a parishioner of Seven Mile Bay Parish; and all his life previous to the last few years had been spent in Albany, where he was one of the most industrious and prosperous farmers. He was ever on the alert to help out in any movement for the advancement of agricultural affairs and stood as a shining example in buying and equipping excellent farms for each and every one of his sons.

Gifted with an abundance of wit and genial humor, he made many friends. Besides being a model farmer he was an exemplary Christian, honest and upright in all his dealings and ever ready to lend a helping hand to those in need. In early life he was married to Caroline Creamer of South Melville, who pre-deceased him thirteen years ago and may time since her demise, had he been known to remark that life failed to hold the same inducement. He had many friends at home and abroad and particularly in the United States which place he has twice visited, since his retirement from farming. His friends there will be saddened by the news of his death.

But a greater blow it is to his family of four sons and three daughters who sincerely mourn the loss of a wise and loving parent.

The sons are, James J. Jeremiah B., and Thomas E. of Albany and William W. of Carleton, while the daughters are Mrs. John Murray and Mrs. Chas. McIvor of Summerside; also Mrs. John Farmer of Kinkora. He leaves also two brothers, John of O'Leary and Abraham of Albany and a sister, Mrs. Emma Clough of Boston, Mass. During his illness he was attended by his spiritual advisor Rev. Eugene Murray and died fortified by the Faith of his Fathers. His funeral took place on Sunday at Seven Mile Bay Cemetery and the long concourse of automobiles testified to the respect in which he was held. Arriving at the Church, Requiem Mass was sung by the pastor, Rev. W. E. Monaghan, while seated in the sanctuary were Rev. Fr. Keefe, Kinkora and Rev. Eugene Murray of Summerside. Rev. M. J. Smith of Kinkora assisted in the choir. Following Mass the remains were conveyed to the nearby cemetery where committal prayers were read by the pastor, and after a well spent life of 78 years, he was laid to rest by the side of his life partner, amid many expressions of sorrow and deep regret, there to await the final Resurrection Summons.

## Spanish War Rages In Avila Sector

MADRID, July 30—(CP-Havas)—The Avila sector northwest of Madrid took the centre of the civil war stage tonight as operations were directed to a comparative standstill along the Brunete front west of the capital.

Attacking insurgent troops were turned back in the Bartolomeo de Linares sector of the Avila zone. Three insurgent positions were engulfed in the same salient after Government troops succeeded in surrounding their defenders.

General Francisco Franco's men made three attempts to capture one of the Government's more important advance posts in the Sierra Guadarrama and Brunete zones but were forced to retreat to their original positions.
