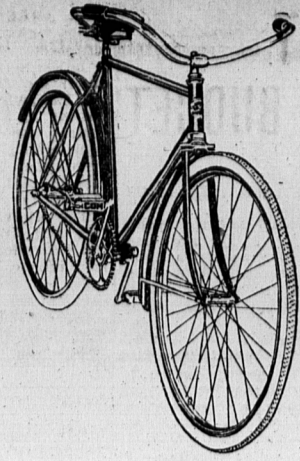

One Feature of the Amendment To the School Act

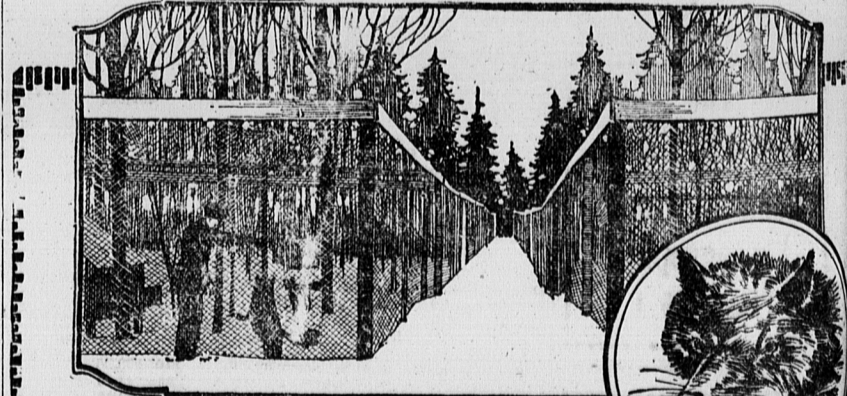
Sir,—The school report just issued shows that the majority of the schools in this province will be closed the ensuing year or if they will continue to operate it will be in violation of the law. The report shows the schools with the required number of resident pupils for the province as follows:

Queens County	95
Prince County	56
King's County	82
Whole Province	233
Schools with 30 pupils and over	33
Prince County	74
King's County	43

Thus the doors of 233 of the primary schools of P. E. Island will close their doors at the next school meeting and only 150 will be allowed to carry on. It is probable that the conditions will be much worse, for the number of residents pupils was 274 less in 1919 than the previous year and assuming that the ratio of decrease would continue there would be a dozen or more additional schools that would be wiped out. This matter is very serious for education and it seems that the teacher's union might have considered what it would lead to. It seems to be a high handed piece of legislation to ram the most extreme measure of consolidation down the throats of the people. Sir William McDonald's millions could not make it a success. The people didn't want it and the government had no mandate for its enforcement. The tax act of the government is not popular, but the people seem to have lost sight of a much greater interference with their rights and liberties.

There is talk already in some districts of hiring a teacher for

themselves and refusing to pay any tax whatever. It will be a return to the days of our grand fathers but much useful knowledge can be imparted without all the
