LUBEC, ME., Oct. 15.—Experts declare the sardine season, now drawing to a close, has been one of the most successful on record, starting in April and continuing almost without a break until the present time. Fish have been in good supply and with few exceptions the cargoes have been in good supply, earning those not suitable going to the smokehouses which call for larger fish.

During the first part of the season the goods were sold almost as fast as they were packed, and not until recently has there been surplus stock accumulating. Some goods have been stored, but nothing like the quality that has been put by for a raise in past seasons.

MONTREAL, Oct. 15.—Cattle receipts 1945. Two loads of good heavy steers averaging 1,300 pounds were sold for \$10.60, and three or four lots of fairly good medium weight steers were sold for \$9.50 to \$10.00. The balance of the cattle were practically all common quality plain big bodied cows in good flesh sold for \$7.00 and good cows up to \$7.75, and \$8.00. Canners were mostly \$3.50 with a range of \$3.25 to \$3.75 and the bulk of the common butcher cows from \$5.00 to \$5.50. Common light bulls sold for \$5.50 and those of the better weights up to \$6.00. Quotations: Butcher steers, good \$9.50 to \$10.60, medium \$8.75 to \$9.25, common, \$7.00 to \$8.25, butchers' heifers, good \$8.50 to \$9.00, medium \$7.50 to \$8.25, common \$5.00 to \$7.00, butcher cows, good \$7.00 to \$8.00, medium \$5.00 to \$6.75, canners \$3.25 to \$3.75, cutters \$3.75 to \$4.50, butcher bulls, common \$5.50 to \$6.00. Calf receipts 2195.

Grass calves were sold from \$5.50 to \$7.00, with the average between \$6.00 and \$6.50. Good veals sold for \$13.00 to \$14.00 and common veals and fall fed calves from \$9.00 to \$11.50.
