NEW YORK, Nov. 9.—(CP)—In a bitterly fought duel, Lieut. J. A. Talbot-Ponsonby, young British army officer, tonight won the international individual military jumping title at the National Horse Show after being carried through four jump-offs by Capt. Eduardo Yanez, leader of the Chilean team.

Mounted on Kineton, a giant gelding, Lieut. Talbot-Ponsonby cleared 40 difficult jumps without a mishap to win before a crowd of more than 12,000.

"Feels Lost" Losing Chums

(Canadian Press Despatch) MONTREAL, Nov. 9.—Claude Bourque, one of the "three musketeers" from Moncton, feels lost now the parting of the ways has come after nearly six years of hockey with Rene Boudreau and Ray Malenfant.

Inseparable chums since school days, they switched allegiance this season from Montreal Canadiens in Montreal senior group, Bourque now goals for Montreal Royals, senior champions of Quebec, while Boudreau and Malenfant, both forwards, play with Quebec Aces, provincial intermediate champions last season.

The group schedule tossed Bourque into play against his former teammates in the first game of the season. Although he admitted today he "had the jitters," with these two sharpshooters against him, he held Aces, in complete subjection scoring a 5-0 shutout.

"They're good around the net," Bourque said in talking the game over. "That's when I'm most afraid of them. I played with them so I feel lost without them."

A kids in Moncton they played on the same school, Malenfant, during the last six seasons has always played with Bourque but there was one year that Boudreau signed with another team.

The three stuck together through junior hockey in the Maritimes, junior and senior hockey in Montreal. Off the ice they always were together, especially when living in Montreal. During the summer months, even though living in different parts of Moncton, they generally would meet.

Bourque, after several seasons playing with "also rans" in Montreal, feels optimistic about Royals going far along the Allan Cup trail. He even goes so far as to say they "might take it."

\$200,000 For Pro Golfers Next Year

CHICAGO, Nov. 9.—(AP)—North America's professional golfing brigade will fire at a \$200,000 target next year.

The happy news will be presented tomorrow at the opening session of the Professional Golfers' Association annual meeting by Robert E. Harlow, head of the organization's tournament bureau. The target will assume even greater proportions, Harlow said today, if plans for a \$25,000 all-star tournament are realized.

With the same list of tournaments that laid out a total of \$156,445 for the 1936 campaign again lined up and to be augmented by new attractions, Harlow predicted pro golf's biggest money year for 1937.

The all-star event, the tentative site and dates for which have not been worked out, would bring together 10 or 12 of the world's hottest shots to scramble for a \$25,000 purse. There also is a possibility that a meeting between Lawson Little, former amateur king, and one of the greatest of match play artists, who is not yet eligible for the P. G. A. title tournament, and the winner of the pro event at Pinehurst next week, will be arranged.

Conny Smythe Worried Over Leafs' Display

TORONTO, Nov. 9.—(CP)—None too gaily, Conny Smythe left for New York tonight to meet with other National Hockey League leaders over the troubled state of the New York Americans, leaving behind speculation over what is to be done about his own Toronto Maple Leafs.

Having started the season with a two-game losing streak, the Leafs are on the spot. Art Jackson, a bustling young player who seemed headed for a good season, has already been shipped to the Toronto farm at Syracuse. He may be back before long.

The Leafs dropped their first two games on home ice, Detroit Red Wings taking the opener 3-1 and three disputed Americans, led by Red Dutton, won Saturday night 3-2. The results have Smythe and others sad, if not jittery.

They hope the situation will improve, perhaps clear up entirely, when Charlie Conacher returns next Saturday night to help out against Chicago Black Hawks. The Big Bomber has been on the bench with an injured wrist.

Would Sever Relations With The A. A. U of C See Amicable Agreement In Amerk Case

MONTREAL, Nov. 9.—(CP)—Further relaxation in the amateur code will force Quebec Amateur Track and Field Association to consider severing its connection with the Amateur Athletic Union of Canada, according to a resolution passed at a meeting here today.

The A. A. U. branch expressed concern at proposed amendments to the amateur code which would narrow further the distinction between amateurs and professionals. Such changes are contrary to "constructive suggestions" offered at the 1935 annual meeting of the A. A. U. of C. in Halifax but not acted upon, the resolution concluded.

General Motors Announces Wage Boost

(A. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) NEW YORK, Nov. 9.—A wage boost of five cents an hour and a Christmas disbursement of \$10,000,000 for employees was announced today by General Motors Corporation along with a "year end" dividend of \$1.50 a share on the common stock.

The pay increase, affecting more than 200,000 employees in the United States is effective immediately, the company announced. It will displace the "appreciation fund" under which the extra payment of \$10,000,000 will be made to workers this year.

Or the wage adjustment, a statement by Alfred P. Sloan, Jr., President, said: "In view of the fact it is likely the current trend of business activity will continue, so far as can now be seen—at least to 1937—and further, rather than to recognize that possibility in the form of an 'appreciation fund' at the end of 1937, it is believed it will be more satisfactory to the organization to be made at the end of the year and anticipate such payment as might distribute it through the year from week to week."

The "year-end" dividend of \$1.50 a share will aggregate approximately \$65,200,000. It is payable Dec. 12 to stock of record Nov. 19. On Sept. 12 the company declared the regular dividend of 50 cents a share and an extra of 75 cents.

"This year-end dividend," Sloan's statement said, "represents the best judgment of the directors as to the balance of estimated earnings of 1936 that may be prudently distributed at this time."

Fred Perry World's No. 1 Amateur Tennis Player Joins Professional Ranks

(C. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) NEW YORK, Nov. 9.—Fred Perry swapped glory for gold today and will show his tennis wizardry in Canada and the United States under professional auspices.

The world's outstanding amateur player thus took a step that threatens to take from England the all-England and United States singles titles as well as the historic Davis Cup.

Deflection of Perry from amateur ranks brightens the hopes of Australia, Germany and the United States for the Davis Cup. In singles it appeared there was no one left capable of halting Don Budge of California who took Perry to five sets in the United States title match last September.

The 27-year-old Briton, winner of the British and American titles three times each and stalwart defender of the Davis Cup for England, cast his lot with Frank Hunter and Howard Vo-hell, a pair of former "first 10" luminaries, who are making their promotional debuts with Perry as the principal offering.

Hunter announced that Perry, the lanky Ellsworth Vines and two other professionals, probably the veteran "Big Bill" Tilden and George Lott, will open a five months' United States and Canadian tour in Madison Square Garden on Jan. 6.

While neither Hunter nor Perry's attorney would divulge the financial phase of the contract which binds Perry from Jan. 5 to May 12 inclusive, except that Perry would work on a percentage basis with a minimum guarantee, it was reliably reported Fred will receive an assured \$25,000.

Hunter predicted Perry will rake in between \$75,000 and \$100,000, but older heads in promotion put the figure from \$50,000 to \$75,000.

BERLIN, Nov. 9.—Gottfried Von Cramm, Germany's no. one player, felt "a personal loss" in Fred Perry's departure from the ranks of amateur tennis.

"This is a great pity for me," said Von Cramm, "because it robs me of an opportunity of beating Perry. With Perry gone, Von Cramm predicted Germany would win the Davis Cup and the All-England title next year."

(Continued from page 1) the city's outskirts against the assaults of Moorish Legionnaires outside the city and Fascist snipers within.

Red Cross estimates placed today's dead at 25, adding to the estimated total of between 100 and 200 killed or wounded, in Sunday's swift visit of Fascist warplanes.

Insurgent bombing and pursuit planes shook the city in three separate sorties today, diving unscathed through the popping bursts of futile anti-aircraft fire.

At 8:30 a. m. the Fascist planes roared down upon the city and its sleepless inhabitants. They came again at 2 p. m., and the last time about 45 minutes later.

Government military leaders, believing the bombardment was directed to crumble city-limit defenses protecting the heart of Madrid, devoted the efforts of their men to rebuilding the fortifications and barricades as fast as they were blasted down.

In each of the warplane attacks, there were nine planes, flying in neat formation until they reached the main lines of the city's defenders—along the Nanzanara River which forms a shallow moat around the west and south sides of the capital.

Garden To Stage Cross-Country Ski Contest

NEW YORK, Nov. 9.—(CP)—A cross-country ski run described in a publicity man's handout as "grueling" will be held within the confines of Madison Square Garden next month.

This became known today when the sport arena's publicity machine started flooding the city with advance notice that the North American winter sports show will be held Dec. 9-12 inclusive.
