HEARST'S DEFEAT STILL THE TALK

In Europe, Along With Tammany And its Ways—
Bernard Shaw On Socialism—Sharp Controversy
Over New English Church Hymnal And Saint
Worship.

LONDON, Dec. 2.—The defeat of William Randolph Hearst and the triumph of Charles E. Hughes in the recent contest for Governor of the State of New York continues to attract the attention of the European papers. For instance a writer over the signature of "An American Exile," in a recent issue of the London Times has the following to say:

"New York City has a normal Democratic majority of 100,000, say the Democrats. The normal Republican majority up the state is in good years sufficient to overcome this. Mr. Roosevelt in 1904 had 170,000 more votes than Justice Parker. Mr. Higgins in the same year was chosen Governor by 80,000 majority. Now Mr. Hughes has to content himself with 60,800. Not enough, some of the New York newspapers say. But it will serve. At any rate it will serve for the moment.

"For consider this. Three fourths of New York City is of foreign origin. We are favored with the presence of Poles, Hungarians, Italians and many other aliens of discordant nationalities in vast

numbers. They are naturalized but they do not—like the Germans—for instance—cease to be aliens. They have the right to vote and they proved their fitness for the franchise by voting almost to a man for Mr. Hearst. If there were some who did not it was because Tammany and Mr. Murphy, who is Tammany's chief, were of opinion for reasons sufficient to them that Mr. Hearst's majority in New York ought not to be too large. Tammany holds this kind foreign vote in its hand. It is organized, drilled, paid and keeps step to the music which Mr. Murphy plays. He calls the tune. Between him and Mr. Hearst there is a bargain, albeit a year ago each was saying his worst of the other. I mean each was telling the truth of the other.

"The plain truth is that with exceptions which need not detain us, the whole State of New York voted against the trusts. For the purposes of this election they were all alike, and Mr. Roosevelt's distinction between good and bad trusts was sent away. The rapacity, the cruelty, the unscrupulousness of the worst was imputed to all. The country is strewn from the Atlantic to the Pacific with wreckage—with men they have crushed—with interests they have ruined—nay with towns they have beggared. Hardly an American in business or out of it who has not suffered by the trusts. There are few lives which are not harder because of the legal extortion practised by those gigantic monopolists. Legal! Well, sometimes legal. But one of the great financiers and promoters of New York said not long ago, 'In putting a new scheme on the market the difficulty is not in getting the money. The difficulty is in keeping inside the law.'

"Socialism," said Mr. George Bernard Shaw, the other evening at the Binney Institute on "The Masses and the Classes," "has solved all of the problems, but it is stopped only by the weakness of people's will. We Socialists have found the way to happy conditions; now you have to find the will."

Mr. Shaw, in his criticism, bore with severity upon the so-called middle class which he said deserved all it was suffering because of its snobbishness. In talking to any audience on the masses and the masses never assume that the masses have anything to do with the masses; and the poorer the audience the more care you should take to avoid claiming it with the masses. "Now," Mr. Shaw continued, "I would feel perfectly safe in alluding to them as 'The masses.' They would probably reply, 'Yes, we do have our coronets and all that sort of that we do represent the masses of the people much better than the House of Lords.'"

Nobody, went on Mr. Shaw, regards himself as belonging to the masses; it is always the other fellow that belongs to the masses. He then sketched the differences between the aristocracy in countries like England and Germany and America but it is doubtful which country really had the advantage in the matter.

The controversy regarding the new English Hymnal which has been condemned by the Archbishop of Canterbury and the Bishop of Winchester and the use of which has been prohibited by the Bishop of Bristol and Exeter is growing in intensity, and the book seems likely to cause a keen controversy between two parties in the Church of England. CHARLES DEVLIN FOR NICOLET

Former Member of Galway Will Run for Canadian Commons

MONTREAL, Dec. 2.—Mr. Charles Devlin, ex-M. P. for Galway, has been chosen as the Liberal candidate in the County of Nicolet, made vacant by the decision of the Postmaster General to sit for Gaspe. The Convention took place yesterday at Beaucourt, where Mr. Devlin received 33 votes, and Dr. Legris, 29, the remainder being scattered. Hon. Mr. Lemieux declared that the choice of the Convention would be the choice of the Government, and all but Dr. Legris retired in favor of Mr. Devlin. The doctor protested somewhat, but the successful aspirant will get the full party vote. Mr. Devlin spoke last night at Nicolet and today after high mass and supper at St. Gregoire and Beaucourt. Hon. Mr. Lemieux's majority at the general election was between three and four hundred. The Conservatives will select their candidate on Tuesday.

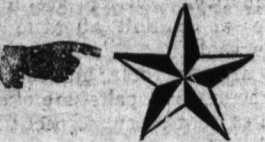
