President Reviews Year's Activities of Women's Institutes

Following are excerpts from the report of the President, Mrs. Julian Herring, at Thursday's annual convention of the P. E. I. Women's Institute:

"It is a real pleasure for me to bring you my first report since I



was elected President of P. E. I. Women's Institutes two years ago. Last year due to my father's death, I was not able to be with you at your Annual Convention and I may say your kind expressions of sympathy were deeply appreciated. For this reason my report will cover the two year period.

Two years ago in 1945 the European War had just ended and V. J. Day was still in the future and as a result this period in our Institutes has been one of transition from war to peace time work. Though we still knit and sew and watch prices these tasks are secondary to our work for home and community.

"During this period a great many islands have been started by our Island Institutes and from this beginning has grown the Province wide Festival, which was such a success this year, and as Institutes work forward to even larger and better Festivals in the years to come.

"Last year we had our first Drama Festival, sponsored by P. E. I. W. I. With the active support of our Institute women we hope these will prove an outlet for rural talent and a pleasant and educational form of expression.

"Due to the increased interest in these cultural fields, we propose to have a convention of arts and literature on our in-coming executive.

Education

"For the first time we have representation on the Educational Council of P. E. I. Island with your President, Mrs. Martin and Mrs. Doyle giving the rural viewpoint on matters pertaining to education in our province. These representatives look part in Panel Discussions and Educational Forums conducted at Hunter River, O'Leary and St. Peter's during the past year.

"As Institutes, we stand solidly behind the plan for Regional Composite High Schools for P. E. I. We have also made strong representations to our Government for the erection of dormitories in connection with Prince of Wales College. As rural women we know that our boys and girls leaving home at an early age need supervision and study and recreation. We have every assurance that these dormitories will be provided as soon as possible.

"We are also interested in Adult Education and have representation on the Adult Education Council, and hope to see this work greatly expanded in the near future.

Agriculture

"Since Agriculture is of prime importance to almost every Institute member, we are pleased to work with and support the Federation of Agriculture, which is really the voice of the Farm People of our Province. I had the pleasure of representing you on the Board of Directors of the Federation and attending their annual meeting as well as the Federated Board meeting held in Charlottetown last fall. In listening to these farmers intelligently discussing their many problems, it is self evident that this meeting together in unification of purpose is the answer to many of our Agricultural problems and I hope the Institutes will continue and even increase their interest in the work carried on for the betterment of rural living.

"I might mention here our interest in Rural Beautification. On this committee we are represented most capably by Mrs. Doyle. I have just returned from the Province of Ontario and one can see there what beauty can be created from common beginnings and here where nature has so beautifully given us the landscape we must supply the frames to treasure and improve our heritage of beauty.
