Increase Noted In Building Activity

OTTAWA, Oct. 17.—(CP)—Value of building permits issued in 58 cities during September was \$3,664,560 an increase of 9.4 per cent. over \$3,331,915 in Sept. 1935, the Dominion Bureau of Statistics reported today.

Quebec showed the greatest gain with an increase of 53.2 per cent. over Sept., 1935, while lesser advances were shown in Prince Edward Island, Nova Scotia, Quebec, Ontario, Manitoba, Alberta and British Columbia. Declines in values of building permits issued were shown in New Brunswick and Saskatchewan.

Value of building authorized by provinces in the Maritimes with Sept., 1935 figures in brackets: Prince Edward Island \$33,850 (23,159); Nova Scotia \$102,261 (\$62,280); New Brunswick \$28,775 (\$28,900).

MARKET FOR CANADIAN HONEY

There is a considerable market in Holland for honey. The principle demand is for the buckwheat variety, which is used by confectioners as an ingredient in cakes and pastries. Domestic production is small and mostly confined to clover honey for table use which is not directly competitive with the imported buckwheat honey Cuba is the principle supplier of the latter kind, followed in 1935 by Mexico, the United States and France. Canadian honey is known and appreciated, and bought whenever prices are competitive.

Islanders Join In Quincey Church Celebration

Many of the people of Prince Edward Island will be interested in the celebration being held in the United Presbyterian Church, Quincey, Mass., in honor of the 40th anniversary of the organization of the church. The entire month of October is known as "Anniversary Month" with special services each Sabbath and at the Thursday evening prayer meetings until the week of October 18th when services will be held each night.

One of the outstanding events of the celebration will be the homecoming and reception to be held on Friday evening, October 23rd, which will be for all former members, present members and friends. Personal invitations have been sent out by the pastor and the session to all living charter members, urging them to attend this reception or to send a letter of remembrance or greetings which will be read that evening.

The charter members now living on Prince Edward Island include Mrs. Charles Martin of Glenmarlin; Miss Belle Gillis, Belle River; Mr. James MacDonald, Caledonia; and Mrs. Mary Brehaut of Montague—the latter being the person who gave the property on which the church building stands. There are also a great many people who live on the Island now who were at one time members and workers in the church, and who are still interested in the welfare and growth of the church. It would be a great pleasure to hear from these friends with a letter of remembrance or greetings which can be read along with the letters from charter members. They have gone from the church but their works and memories linger on.

The climax of the entire celebration will be the concluding services on Sunday, October 25th. Rev. John O. Paisley, who conducted the first communion service after the church was organized, will be present and preach at both services and will officiate at the communion service which will follow the sermon at the evening service. This service is being held just forty years to a day from the time of the first communion.

The church was organized in July, 1896 and the first communion service was held on October 25th that same year. At the time of its organization there were forty members, most of whom originated from Prince Edward Island. Today the membership is almost four hundred, with members of all nationalities, though we still hold a monopoly on the "Down Easters." The Sunday School keeps increasing in numbers so that at the present time there is need of larger Sunday School quarters, although a few years ago the basement was turned into a very fine assembly hall with several individual class rooms. A lot of land adjoining the church site has been purchased, on which it will soon be necessary to build another addition. Mr. Angus MacLeod, formerly of New Haven, P. E. I., is the Sabbath School superintendent.

The Elders of the church at the present time are all from Prince Edward Island with one exception. They are as follows: William Ross, Grahams Road; Daniel MacLeod, Vernon River; James Stewart, Westpoint; Angus J. MacLeod, Eldon, Belfast; Angus MacLeod, New Haven; John MacPhee, New Haven and J. B. Sutherland from Cape Breton.

The trustees include Laughlin MacPhee, Bellview; Alexander MacPherson, Valleyfield; Charles Campbell, Kingston; also George C. Russell, Joseph Mullen, Lloyd Tribou, John MacLeod and Clarence Taylor, all non-down easters.

The deacons include William Gillis of Orwell Cove; Alexander Nicholson, Grandview; Alexander MacPherson, Valleyfield; also Lloyd Tribou and John Hawes of Weymouth, Massachusetts.

The church is very proud of the number of young people who have gone out to become ministers of the gospel or christian workers, one of whom is Rev. Roy J. Stewart, son of Mr. James Stewart, formerly of Westpoint. Others include Rev. Robert Nichol, son of Rev. and Mrs. William Nichol of Quincey, pastor of Quincey church; Rev. Irving J. Fletcher, pastor of the Neponset Community Church, although not from down east, was first brought to the church in his childhood days by Mrs. Ben Haslam, (Blanche Abbott) Springfield, P. E. I.; Rev. Duncan MacPherson, of York, Pa., son of Mr. and Mrs. Murdoch MacPherson of Quincey; Rev. Wilber Kerr, son of Mrs. Jennie Kerr of Quincey, and the late John Kerr; Miss Sadie Campbell, graduate of the Philadelphia Bible School, is the daughter of Mrs. Catherine Campbell, formerly of Fredericton; Mr. Alvin Cheever, a

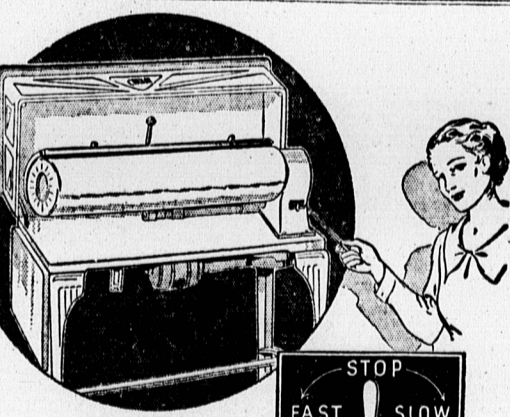
