It was most enjoyable. Rev. Mr. Strathie presided and presented at the close a hearty vote of thanks to the lecturer.

The show at the People's Theatre last night comprised three reels of photography of the biggest amount for the money ever offered even then, and the combination of a touching society play, a funny love story and an Indian subject filled the bill sumptuously as far as the silent drama was concerned. The personal and entertaining feature of the evening was C. E. Taylor, billed as magician and ventriloquist. HOPEWELL HILL, May 1—Mrs. Thomas Downie, of Hatvey, died suddenly at her home there last evening.
