THE NEW CONDENSED MILK FACTORY.

The GUARDIAN had the pleasure yesterday of meeting Mr. M. Oakes, of Newport, Me., who is in the city in connection with the placing of the plant of the Condensed Milk Factory. The Condensed Milk Factory is being equipped with the most modern machinery obtainable. In fact when completed it will be different from any factory of the kind at present in existence.

The building which is a fine one has been constructed with special care and is 150 feet long by 38 feet wide, with an addition on each side. The one on the north side is for the boiler room and that on the south for receiving room. The building is divided into three sections. On the western side is the condensing room, 38x50 ft. with a ceiling 21 feet high. The eastern section is a room of the same size; the center section is for a packing room and is also 38x50 feet. The second floor will be used for storage.

There are two condensed milk factories in Nova Scotia, one in Quebec and one in Manitoba. The market for the product of the Charlottetown factory will not be in competition with the Canadian factories but will be against the Anglo-Swiss people. The factories of the other provinces have combined to keep up the price and to control trade. The point to be considered now is whether Canada will manufacture her own supply, instead of importing as at the present time.

Perhaps the most interesting part of the factory is the tin machinery for the manufacture of cans. It will be possible to manufacture 1,200 to 1,500 pound cans a day. The department is so equipped that with a small additional outlay it will produce double the quantity of cans.

The number of employees that will be engaged will be regulated by the supply and it is impossible at the present time to tell the amount of help that will be needed.

The process of manufacturing condensed milk calls for pure cane sugar, and the removal of a certain portion of the water from the milk by boiling in a vacuum.

Mr. Oakes, the gentleman who is in the city placing the machinery, says that too much stress cannot be placed on the cleanliness of the dairies and showed THE GUARDIAN the form of contract used by the Aroostook Condensed Milk Co., extracts from which we publish below.

The following are the instructions to the producer used by the Aroostook Condensed Milk Company.

The milking of producer's cows shall be done in the most cleanly manner, and the milk shall be strained through wire cloth strainers, as per sample in said Company's office, and the milk shall be thoroughly cooled immediately after it is drawn from the cow, by frequently stirring the same until the animal heat is expelled, and the temperature of said milk is reduced to 5° degrees inside of 45 minutes, by placing the can in which it is contained, in a tub or vat of cold water, deep enough to come up to the height of the milk in the can, and said tub or vat shall contain at least three times as much water as the milk to be cooled, and the water of said tub or vat shall be renewed daily by water, or ice sufficient quantities to prevent any fouling or smell of the water. In winter weather said tub or vat shall be guarded against freezing; and great care shall be used to protect the milk during and after cooling, that the milk shall not become frozen, and the milk not to exceed 60 degrees when delivered at the factory.

flow over the top to carry off the warm water, and that the can in which the milk is cooled shall be placed in water immediately after milking, and shall remain therein until the process of cooling shall be finished, and the time arrives for hauling same to factory. All said milk shall be transported to factory on suitable spring wagons.

The cans of milk shall be covered with canvass while being conveyed to the factory, and the covers so employed shall be kept clean by the party of the second part.

The night's and morning's milk shall not be mixed, remnants of each milking excepted, which may be placed in the last or smaller cans, and that no milk shall be kept over to be delivered at a subsequent time; and

That officially sealed cans, holding forty quarts, shall be furnished by the party of the second part, and brought full. Remnants may be brought in twenty and thirty quart cans.

It is understood and agreed that the company will clean and steam such cans at the factory free of charge, but the producer shall keep the outside bright and clean. The pails and strainers employed in the dairy shall be kept thoroughly clean, and shall be scalded in boiling water and dried morning and night.

Immediately before the milk is placed in the cans, the producer is supposed to examine, and to thoroughly rinse them with clean water, and to take care to keep the cans and milk free from dirt and impurities of any kind. When the cans are not in use, they shall be turned down on a rack, with covers off except only when in transit.

All of the strippings, as well as the first part of the milk shall be delivered. No milk shall be delivered that is taken from a cow that has calved within twelve days, nor from a cow that will come in or calve inside of sixty days.

The cows shall not be fed on feed which will impart a disagreeable flavor to the milk, or upon any feed which will not produce milk of standard rich-

ness, namely:—turnips, barley sprouts, brewer or distilled grains, linseed meal, glucose refuse, starch refuse, or any damaged feed or ensilage.

It is also understood that the agent have right to examine the place for keeping the cows and for milking them and the place for cooling the milk and keeping the pails and strainers. It is also understood that the stables and sheds for keeping the cows and milk shall be thoroughly ventilated, and neatly whitewashed during the first month of this contract.

The following is the form used by the Inspector of the Maine Condensed Milk Co.
