Serious Epidemic of Typhoid in Quebec Village

MASONVILLE, Que., April 19.—Eight are dead and one hundred and thirty six dangerously ill. Such is the total ravages of typhoid which has broken out here. The horses are too weak to draw the hearse, the undertaker is incapacitated, the water is contaminated and drinking water is carried in barrels and rationed out. The lack of medical supplies and bad roads over which relief workers must travel are grim testimonies of the seriousness of the situation. The illness of the workers in the electric light plant threatens to add to the misery when the town will be in darkness. Sixty per cent of the school children in town are afflicted.

QUEBEC TO CUT BOOZE PRICES SURPLUS REACHES \$7,500,000

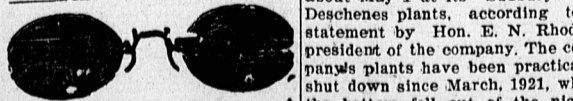
MONTREAL, April 20.—A reduction in the prices of alcoholic liquors and wines is expected to be announced after the 1st of May next by the Quebec Liquor Commission. That body will complete its second year of operation of the 30th of April and though no financial statement will be available before the end of the fiscal year of the province in June, it is said that the surplus will reach over \$7,500,000, as compared with a little more than \$4,000,000 last year. It is understood that recently there was a misunderstanding between some of the members of the liquor commission regarding the price charged and that finally an agreement was reached to cut down the charges. With the completion of the year important changes are also forecast in the present composition of the commission. Not only will there be an additional commissioner appointed, but one of the present members is likely to resign.

ITALIAN PREMIER IS ARRESTED FOR SPEEDING

BOLOGNA, Italy, April 20.—Benito Mussolini, the Italian Premier, was arrested today and fined as a speeder. The Premier, in his red racing car, was driving at a fast rate of speed by a traffic policeman and halted before a magistrate who imposed a fine. The policeman was greatly perturbed when the identity of his prisoner became known. The Premier, however, had nothing but praise for the officer, to whom he said: "Always do your duty and fear nothing."

CANADIAN PLANTS, LONG CLOSED, ARE TO RESUME

OTTAWA, April 19.—The British American Nickel Corporation, Limited, is to resume operations on or about May 1 at its Sudbury and Deschenes plants, according to a statement by Hon. E. N. Rhodes, president of the company. The company's plants have been practically shut down since March, 1921, when the bottom fell out of the nickel market as the result of the cessation of the war demand and the throwing on the market of vast quantities of war scrap nickel.

U. S. Sprinter Wins Marathon

BOSTON, April 19.—Clarence De Mars, a Boston sprinter won the Annual Marathon for the third time in two hours 23 minutes and 47 seconds, which was five minutes slower than the record which he held.

McTigue's Partner Defeated Hulkes

LONDON, April 18.—Edward P. Egan, Oxford, who holds the Olympic light-heavyweight boxing championship, tonight defeated F. J. Hulkes, of St. Pancras, in the third round, at Alexander Palace, thus winning the amateur boxing association heavy-weight championship.
Egan trained for the bout in Dublin, acting as a sparring partner. Tonight, Mike McTigue, who was the thirty-ninth time the championship had been contested, Egan is a native of the United States.

Johnson and Fulton Suspended

BOSTON, April 18.—Floyd Johnson and Fred Fulton, the boxers who are to meet at Jersey City next Monday night, were suspended indefinitely by the State of Massachusetts by the Boxing Commission today. The Commission held that the men had failed to carry out an agreement to box for the Arena A. C. in this city last Monday, and based its judgment on telegraph and written exchanges that were produced by the Club as evidence.
With the boxers, their managers, Charles Cook and James Johnson, and all the boxers under their management, were also suspended indefinitely.

COMMUNIST PARTY OF AMERICA DISSOLVED

NEW YORK, April 20.—The Communist Party of America has dissolved itself and diverted its members to the Worker's Party of America, which it recognizes as the only affiliation of the Third International of Moscow in the United States, it was disclosed today by C. E. Ruthenberg, Secretary of the Central Executive Committee of the Worker's Party.

BIG COMMITTEE ON CHURCH UNION

OTTAWA, April 20.—A committee composed of fifty laymen and women of the Presbyterian Church in Ottawa was appointed "for the purpose of supporting the General Assembly's policy of Church Union and maintaining its authority," at a meeting this afternoon of the Presbyterian ministers of the city and two representatives from each church. The committee will arrange a mass meeting shortly at which the question of Church Union will be thoroughly discussed.

LIVELY MEETING OF PRESBYTERY

MONTREAL, April 20.—Rising to address a gathering of elders and ministers at the adjourned meeting of the Montreal Presbytery here tonight, Rev. Dr. Clark McGee, moderator of the Presbyterian Church in Ottawa, made an emphatic protest against charges that the General Assembly would be packed when the Church Union question came before it.
Rev. Dr. W. D. Reid jumped to his feet and said he had written on one of the letters charging that the Unionists were deliberately trying to "pack" the Assembly and that he stood by his original statement. He declared that certain Unionists had tried to strangle the Presbytery but that they could not strangle the Press. Rev. Doctors McCaskill and Scott also admitted that they, too, were among the persons attacked by Dr. Clark, and Mr. Scott added that it was the most unfair Presbytery in the whole of his experience. The discussion eventually died down.

PHILADELPHIA, April 18.

Philadelphia opened the American League season here today by defeating Washington 3 to 1. A home run by Dykes in the second inning, with a team mate on the sacks, was the blow that sent Walter Johnson down to defeat. More than 20,000 persons saw the game.

CINCINNATI, April 18.

Toney outpitched Rixey in the second game of the season here today and St. Louis evened up the series by defeating Cincinnati, 4 to 2. Mann made the first home run of the season in the third inning.

CHICAGO, April 18.

Boehler weakened in the 8th inning and Chicago bounded out six hits including two doubles and a triple and defeated Pittsburgh, 7 to 2, in the second game of the series.

CLEVELAND, April 18.

One of the largest opening day crowds that ever witnessed an American League game here saw Cleveland make a ninth inning rally and defeat Chicago, 6 to 5 today.

BROOKLYN, April 18.

The Brooklyn Dodgers staged a big ninth inning rally today to beat out the Phillies, 6 to 5.

ST. LOUIS, Mo., April 18.

With George Sisler on the sick list, the Browns lost the opening game of the season today, 9 to 6.

biscuit makers in England. The cake is 10 feet high, 8 feet in diameter, and weighs 300 pounds. It is divided into four tiers, each bearing symbolical of the lineage of the Royal bridegroom and his bride.
On the first tier is a reproduction of Windsor Castle and St. George's Church, and on the second is a relief in sugar work of Clams Castle, ancestral home of the bride. Among the figures on the third tier is a Masonic emblem, signifying the connection of the Duke and the bride's father, the Earl of Strathmore, with that Order. Below are figures of cupids standing on ladders and ringing bells of happiness.
Unusual of all the presents, however, is a remarkable clock, which in addition to showing the hours, minutes and seconds in the usual way, also indicates the day of the week, and of the month, the phases of the moon, and after striking each hour plays a march. On the dial is a representation of Whitehall, while figures of the King, Queen and all the members of the Royal Family pass around in a procession. As becomes Scottish clock, no marches played on Sunday, nor is there a procession. These actions automatically stopped on Sabbath.
The clock is the gift of the city of Glasgow. It was made in 1804 for King George III, and is one of the finest mechanical pieces ever produced in Scotland.
Fourteen huge wedding cakes with the combined weight of 2,500 pounds have already been presented to the bride, and another is en route from Montreal.
The Privy Council has as yet made no decision as to the future position of the bride, but it is believed that the King is reserving this as a surprise and that he will confer a Royal title upon her the day of the wedding.
