HOUSEHOLD HINTS

The bouquet of herbs brings out the flavor of boiled mutton, cold or salmon as nothing else can. The ideal French seasoning for a pot roast is a bouquet of parsley, chervil, basil and coriander. The attic is far better than the cellar for storing canned fruits, jellies, seeds, roots, and so on. A delicious frozen dessert is made of 1 1/2 pints double cream, the grated rind of orange and the juice of 2 oranges of sugar and 1 pound stale macaroons grated. Whip the cream, stir in the other ingredients and freeze. Corsets can be cleaned at home by laying on a marble-topped washstand and brushing with a stiff brush and good white soap and water. Finally, dip the brush into clear, water and scrub again, then dry with rough towels. To restore scorched linen, peel and slice two onions and extract the juice. Add to it half an ounce white soap, cut up; two ounces fuller's earth and half a pint of vinegar. Boil together, then cool and spread over the scorched spot. Dry, then wash the linen. Maple sugar frosting will make a plain cake into something extra fine. Use one cupful each of maple and granulated sugar, a teaspoonful of butter and three teaspoonfuls of cream. Boil five minutes and stir till slightly thickened. Dip the cakes in.
