Cream butter with sugar and add molasses and egg. Stir in dry ingredients alternately with sour milk. Chill thoroughly. Roll to 1/4 inch thickness and cut. Place on greased baking sheet and bake in moderate hot oven (375 deg. F.) about 12 minutes. Cool and decorate with icing. Makes about 4 dozen cookies.
