FAST ATLANTIC SERVICE LIVERPOOL TO HALIFAX

I. N. Ford Says Such a Proposal is Before Canadian Ministers—Canadian Arch will Stand Despite Over Zealous Police Officials.

LONDON, July 23.—The results of the conference between the Canadian ministers and the board of trade are not yet announced, but without doubt the establishment of a fast Atlantic service between Liverpool and Halifax has been proposed. What Liverpool shippers are expecting is a combination between the Allan and Elder-Demster lines, and Sir Christopher Furness, with subsidies to be paid by the British Government and the Dominion in the proportion of one-third for a service consisting of two 22-knot and two 18-knot steamships. This would take the Allan line out of the conference, where it is controlled by the Morgan combination, and would involve another freight war similar to the sea campaign opened by the Houston line's cut rates against the King's charges to South Africa. No decision has been reached by the board of trade, but the offer of the British government to pay one-third of the subsidy is an old one, and probably will be renewed if a fast steamer can be substituted for the present service between Vancouver and Brisbane. Mails can be despatched from England to Australia in twenty-six days by way of the Canadian Pacific under a joint system of imperial and colonial subsidies.

AFRAID OF SUBSIDIES. British officials admit that the chief source of apprehension is the ultimate effect of the adoption of the subsidy system on a large scale. They are afraid that the Americans may consider it to be a direct challenge to themselves, and may be inclined to stand behind Mr. Morgan and subsidize their own shipping interest with energy and efficiency.

ABANDONED AND ON FIRE.

LONDON, July 23.—The Holland-American liner Rynram, which arrived at Rotterdam yesterday, had on board the crew of the Norwegian barque Pons Arli from Paspebiac, which was reported by the steamer Kaiser Wilhelm der Grosse yesterday as abandoned and on fire on July 20, in lat. 49 deg. north, long. 18 deg. west.

RED HOT ROCK FROM SEA.

LISBON, July 24.—A despatch from the Azore Islands says there has just been a terrific sub-marine volcanic eruption off Horta, Island of Fayal. A great rock, incandescent with heat, was thrown up. The people are panic stricken.

BRITISH COLUMBIA LOAN.

LONDON, July 24.—The market is over-loaded with gilt edged securities. British Columbia was about to issue a loan of £723,000, but has decided to withdraw and wait a more appropriate time for floating the loan.

BOURINOT LOSING STRENGTH.

OTTAWA, July 24.—Sir John Bourinot is gradually losing strength, and it is feared that he cannot recover.

NOT LIKELY A HOLIDAY.

OTTAWA, July 24.—It is not likely the government will proclaim coronation day a public holiday.

HELD UP BANK CASHIER.

FORTVILLE, Ind., July 24.—Just before noon today while assistant Cashier Prettip was in the Fortville bank, a well-dressed man came in, pointed a revolver at him and fired. The ball went wild and the man then demanded that Prettip give him \$2,500 or be killed. The robber escaped to the woods where he was captured after being shot several times.

THE CANADIAN ARCH.

Over-zealous police officials will not succeed in securing the removal of the Canadian arch as a public nuisance from Whitehall. The coronation committee of the city of Westminster, while prevented by the King's wishes from renewing the civic decorations along the short route of the possession, has authorized Commissioner Preston to redecorate the arch and to illuminate it on coronation night. Otherwise there will be no public scheme of decoration for the street. There is no sign of a revival of speculative activity in the sale of seats nor will it be possible to obtain high prices without a guarantee of a return of the money in the event of a second postponement. There will be a large number of absentees among the peers of the Abbey service. Many are without houses in London and are frightened by the cost of livery for coronation day, since they cannot drive to the Abbey in cabs but must go in splendid state.

TO FIGHT LAND-OWNER'S COMBINE.

The nationalist party is determined to fight the Irish landlords' combine, which has been admittedly formed with the object of crushing the United Irish League. John Redmond and his supporters are satisfied that the Duke of Abercorn, the Marquis of Waterford, Col. Sanderson, Smith and Barry, and the other landlords who comprise the combine, are engaged in proceedings which bring them within the law of conspiracy. It is stated that the nationalist leaguers decided last night to take legal proceedings against the land-owners' trust.

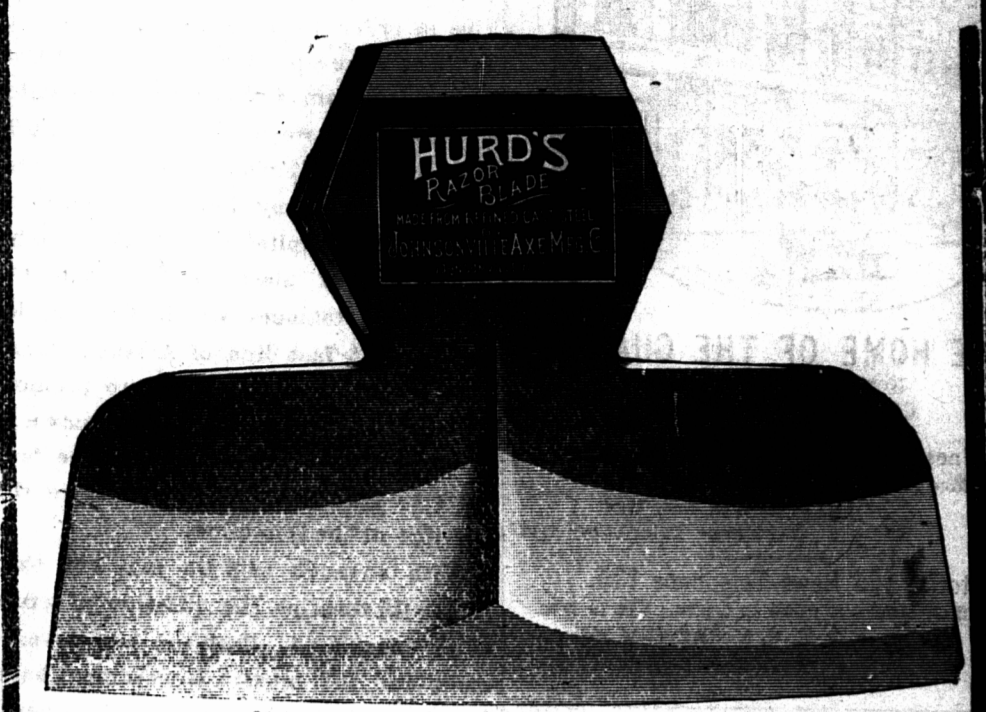
