Salvation Army Band Hold Anniversary

The Salvation Army Citadel Band has now completed its first year of service to the interests of the cause in this community and surrounding district. To mark this first anniversary of its organization a special musical festival was given in the Citadel to an enthusiastic audience.

An enjoyable program was rendered in which some prominent local artists were heard. Professor A. R. Kendall, rendered two choice pianoforte selections and Mr. Ben G. Aorn, two excellent vocal numbers.

Councillor B. R. Holman, very ably occupied the chair, and kindly expressed representative local sentiment concerning the popularity and usefulness of the Citadel band in the community. The chairman also complimented the band members on their progress and faithfulness during the first year of their musical career.

The band items rendered during the program included the band's first tune, Duke St. Jocularly known as No. 4 and also two other of the Easter selections used during the special Sunday services, "Easter Hymn," and "Crown the Saviour."

The Citadel brass quartette party rendered "Adagio," from Schubert, and Adjutant and Mrs. Martin in a vocal duet, rendered a beautiful composition of the late Professor (Envo) W. A. Hawley, who is so vividly remembered in this city, entitled "He Was Wounded For Our Transgressions." The audience joining in the chorus.

During the evening, a review of the first year's service was presented by Adjutant Martin. In referring to the equipment purchased last year at a cost of \$1,200 respectful reference was made to four memorial instruments in the set. The drum, in memory of the late Colonel F. S. Moore, a cornet, in memory of the late Senator B. C. Prowse, a cornet in memory of the late Professor (Envo) W. A. Hawley, and also horn in memory of the late Mrs. G. R. Beer.

The band's record of service is a very creditable one. It has participated in an average of three open air services and five indoor services per week during the entire year. The band also inaugurated last summer its first season of Eventide Musical Festivals, given on the band stand in Queen Square Gardens, at 8:30 on Sunday evenings to large and very appreciative audiences of citizens.

The League of Mercy has had very hearty co-operation from the band, in frequent visits to the various institutions in the locality where the League conducts spiritual services.

The present strength of the band will be added to, during the present year and it is hoped, make further progress under the leadership of Adjutant A. W. Martin, who is ably assisted by deputy bandmaster G. Austin and band secretary F. J. Chandler, Jr.

University Degree For Dish Washing

LONDON, Eng., April 7.—A writer in the Sheffield Weekly Telegraph contributes to that paper the following account of United States universities based on statements of a high education authority.

A very high academic authority has just been condemning a great deal of education in the United States as "quackery" and whatever defence those interested may offer, there can be no doubt at all that there is a lot more than "something" in the indictment.

What would the erudite, tradition-soaked Dons of Oxford or Cambridge think if it were proposed that their universities should grant a B.A. pass degree for proficiency in clog-dancing? They would probably think the proposal too extravagant for a burlesque revue, let alone a seat of learning. Yet undergraduates in some U.S. universities are permitted to qualify in this manner.

And clog-dancing is not the only educational aberration of which America is guilty. If the student's faculty lies not so much in his twinkling feet as in his hands, then he may become "B.A." by learning to manipulate a typewriter.

If he is just an ordinary rough diamond, with no more brains than to learn the difference between a Cumberland "fall" and an American "gouge," he need not despair of academic honors. He will be able to find a university which grants pass degrees for wrestling!

Natural history may attract him, but he may deplore its lack of practical value in piling up the dollars. Once more the United States university is prepared to meet him. Let him submit a thesis on bee-keeping and proudly assume the dignity of a cap and gown.

ON DISH WASHING

The kitchen and its associated offices also provide a fruitful field for the American undergraduates. Not only are pass degrees issued for work on such subjects as preparing family meals, cookery research, the etiquette of hospitality and laundry work, but an ingenious girl graduate passed out of her university triumphantly with a thesis on dish washing!

Even this is not quite so amazing or amusing as the grant, by a Southern State university, of the degree of Doctor of Philosophy for a monograph on the cold storage of chicken meat. Nothing, in fact, is too surprising or extravagant for certain (mainly commercial) educational authorities in the United States. It has been stated, without contradiction, that at one university the student can get a degree for anything under the sun from elementary millinery to celestial mechanics! And cynical educationists look forward to the time when manouring, toe-dancing and hair-bobbing will be admitted to the academic curricula.
