SUPREME COURT—In the Supreme Court Saturday, the case of F. W. Simmons, of Wilmont, vs. the Magic Fox Co., an action on four promissory notes, amounting to \$14,000 was argued before Chief Justice Mathieson and Mr. Justice Hazzard, the plaintiff asking for a new trial. This case was tried at the last Hilary Term before Mr. Justice Fitzgerald and a jury when a verdict was rendered for the defendant, Martin, K.C., and Saunders for the plaintiff, Johnston, K.C., and Bentley K.C. for the defendant. The argument was finished and judgment reserved.

A. on the Students Volunteer Movements on Missions. PRESENTED WITH PURSE—The Davidson, Sask., Leader referring to Mr. Hornsby, formerly of this city says: "On Tuesday afternoon prior to the departure of Mr. W. L. Hornsby and family on the afternoon train en route to their new home at Prince George, B. C., Mr. Hornsby was made the recipient of a purse of money. Mayor D. S. Hutchison made the presentation in the office of the town clerk, on behalf of a host of business and professional men, a number of whom were present. Taken quite by surprise, Mr. Hornsby assured those present that it was not necessary to gift him that he might carry away and retain happy memories of, and pleasant associations with the people of Davidson, nevertheless he appreciated the gift and the spirit which prompted it. CAPT. READ'S ATTITUDE

Sir—1 notice in your editorial of the 5th inst., under the caption "Sir Wilfrid's Manifesto" a statement which says that "frantically supported Sir Wilfrid Laurier's position on the platform in Prince County as an anti-conscriptionist." You have been misinformed. I have stated both in the press and on the platform that democracy for which Liberalism especially stands was based on certain principles among which Universal National Service was one of the essentials. The state undertakes the protection of her citizens and the citizens as a quid pro quo undertake to render service to the state. This applies to every age and to both sexes. It follows therefore, that where military service is required for the protection of the state it not given voluntarily that compulsion must ensue. I have differed with both Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Sir R. L. Borden on this question of Compulsory service and have agreed more or less completely with Sam Hughes. The ex-Minister of Militia used the following words in discussing the Conscription Bill when the House was in committee of the whole on that Act on the 9th June, 1917. You will understand this after I had announced my views in the "Pioneer". These are his words. See page 2267 of the Hansard July 9th, 1917. "I took the liberty the other day of suggesting to members wishing to make suggestions on the 'Bill' (Military Service Bill) should put them in concise form. 'I prefer the Militia Act, as better, more elastic, more workable, less inclined to cause friction, and more inclined to produce good results, but the government does not so consider it.'"
