This was the statement made by Sir Thomas Shaughnessy, the president of the C. P. R., in the course of an interview while in Detroit last week, on his way back from attending a meeting of the directors of the 'Soo' line at Minneapolis. "There is a big difference between the American's and the Canadian's outlook upon life," said Sir Thomas, according to the Detroit 'Free Press.' IN MEMORIAM

In cherished remembrance of the late Peter McPherson, Heatherdale, King's Co., who departed this life on the 30th day of January, 1909, in the sixty-second year of his age. Three brothers and one sister survive him. John in Boston, Samuel, in British Columbia, Donald, on St. Peter's Road, and Mrs. Alexander Martin, in Martville. The subject of this brief notice was the son of Norman and Mrs. McPherson, also of Heatherdale, both of whom having preceded him some years ago. In the death of Mr. McPherson, the community has lost an upright citizen, beloved and respected by all who had the pleasure of his acquaintance, and the experience of his sterling worth and integrity in all matters pertaining to the church and community. For many years he was identified with the Presbyterian Church, in Valleyfield of which he was a most loyal and consistent member even to the end. His death was plain, humble, and peaceful in his own home, firm and steadfast in his convictions, and as a neighbor, thoughtful and obliging. In his last sickness he was calm and entirely resigned to the final result. His memory is surely blessed in the hearts of the bereaved family and all who truly knew him for they have the comforting assurance that death to him was but a happy transition from a world of care and toil to the Palace of the King. Truly it may be said of Mr. McPherson that his end was peace for he died as he had lived, trusting in the merits of his crucified Lord. He rests now in his grave and his works follow him. He leaves to mourn, a widow, five sons, Norman in Heatherdale; Rodk, Dan and John, in Montague; and Alexander, on the homestead; also four daughters, Mrs. Eaton and Christy in Boston; Mrs. Angus Martin, in Glenwilliam, and Margaret at home. All of whom were witnesses of the closing scene in the life of a beloved husband and father. The funeral service was conducted by Rev. A. S. Stewart, Valleyfield, assisted by Rev. C. G. Sheehan, Montague, after which the remains were borne away, accompanied by a large concourse of sympathizing relatives and friends and laid to rest in the cemetery in Valleyfield.

We were discussing Pittsburg and New York men, and I could not help noticing they referred scornfully to fortunes that did not touch somewhere from \$25,000,000 to \$75,000,000. "The Canadian has a more philosophical, a more reasoning, point of view. He likes to make money for his needs, his luxuries even, but he does not enter into it to the exclusion of every other interest, like the American money maker. He finds time for recreation and relaxation, and cultivating other sides of him than the money-making faculty. When he has amassed what he considers a sufficient sum, he stops to enjoy his life and the fruits of his labors. "What I deplore most of all is the effect that many of these huge fortunes have upon the children of those who have struggled and suffered to acquire them. I mean the self-satisfied, superior, snobbish complacency with which the sons of great millionaires regard life. They seem to think they owe the world nothing, and to revel in the fact of their riches, taking it for granted that they have no duties and no responsibilities other than the spending of money. Character and individuality worth anything are formed only through efforts and the conquering of obstacles, but these scions of wealthy houses have no incentives, to effort, and the result is lamentable. "I do not believe in the aristocracy of dollars. If there must be an aristocracy, let it be of brain, refinement, and work. Let it be above all else, an aristocracy of well-directed, useful, conscientious work."
